



E.A.G.L.E.: acronym for “**Earth Agency for Global Law Enforcement**” (source: “Adventures in Iowa” by D. G. Littlefield, OAA)

E.S.P.: acronym for “**ESPer capability**”

E.S.S.: acronym for “**emergency saucer separation**”

E.T.A.: acronym for “estimated time of arrival”

E'ay: a humanoid male who was denizen of Kemet; in 2280, served as Grand Vizier under the pharaoh; was hairless; he tended to use prison guards who were brawny and dumb; his blood had much copper content; suspected of being Romulan but turned out to be Pharaoh's brother, the Pharaoh had removed or killed all potential rivals, except for him; tried to poison Pharaoh, giving him cocaine and various other drugs (source: “A Hole in My Cover” by Jim Ausfaul, OAE)

E'taH: one of P'taH's cubs; his favorite and most mischievous (source: “The McAulliffe Rescue” by Tina Schinella, OAB)

Eagle, U.S.S., NCC-956: a *Leonidas*-class cruiser which was to have served as part of Operation: Retrieve (source: *Star Trek VI: The Undiscovered Country* by Nick Meyers et al, TUC)

Eagle's Ridge: a landmark on Earth located near Riverside, Iowa (source: “Adventures in Iowa” by D. G. Littlefield, OAA)

Eames, D.: a Human male; a colonist from Tarsus IV; he was an eye witness to the atrocities committed by Governor Kodos of that planet; he was killed by Lenore Karidian (daughter of Kodos) (source: “The Conscience of the King” by Barry S. Trivers, TOS1)

ear comm: a communications device placed in the ear for private reception; in use aboard Federation vessels for centuries (source: “No Place Like Home” by Nomad, OAC)

ear jack: colloquial expression for an “ear comm” (source: “*Ad Astra Per Aspera*” by Randall Landers, OAE)

ear receiver: see “ear comm”

Earp, Morgan: a Terran male; a quick and nasty-tempered gunfighter, known as “the man who kills on sight”; in the Melkotian replay of history, he killed Chekov because he wanted Billy Claiborne's girlfriend, Sylvia (the Russian navigator was forced into playing Billy Claiborne by the Melkotians); in reality, Morgan Earp was a recently appointed police officer; he and Doc Holliday opened fire on the mostly unarmed Clantons, starting the infamous “Gunfight at the OK Corral”; Morgan was injured in the melee, shot in the shoulder (source: “Spectre of the Gun” by Gene L. Coon, TOS3; *clantongang.com* website)

Earp, Virgil: a Terran male; historically, the chief of police of Tombstone, Arizona, Terra circa 1881; due to Kirk's faulty memory of the events, the Melkotian had Wyatt Earp be the town marshal; Virgil had trouble with both the Clantons and Sheriff Behan, but apparently tried to calm everyone down rather than letting the gunfight begin; he was unsuccessful as Morgan Earp and Doc Holliday opened fire; he was shot in the leg during the gunfight; he was fired a few days later by the city of Tombstone because of this gunfight (source: “Spectre of the Gun” by Gene L. Coon, TOS3; *clantongang.com* website)

Earp, Wyatt: a Terran male, and professional gambler; due to Kirk's faulty memory of the events, the Melkotian had Wyatt Earp be the town marshal, and this was not the case; Wyatt had been deputized by his brother Virgil after they'd had trouble with Ike Clanton the night before; his best friend was Doc Holliday (source: “Spectre of the Gun”

by Gene L. Coon, TOS3; *clantongang.com* website)

Earth (Terra, Sol III): generally used as the name for the third planet of the Sol star system; a class M world with an advanced civilization; home world of the Humans; if translated, most of the planets inhabited by sentient races would be translated as this, hence the recent trend to refer to Sol III as Terra; virtually all of the planet's power comes from solar cells; Earth is the location of Starfleet Headquarters (San Francisco) (source: *Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home* by Leonard Nimoy et al, TVH)

Earth Agency for Global Law Enforcement: a 23rd century law enforcement Terran agency; it functions in a manner similar to the old F.B.I. of the United States, except that it operates world-wide (source: “Adventures in Iowa” by D. G. Littlefield, OAA)

Earth Colony 2: a Terran settlement with a research station; George Samuel Kirk had hoped to be transferred to this research station prior to his death on Deneva (source: “What Are Little Girls Made of?” by Robert Bloch, TOS1)

Earth Outposts: See “**Outposts, Federation**”

Earth Traffic Control: the space port authority for civilian space craft in Earth orbit (source: *Waiting on Serenidad* by Rob Morris, OAH)

Earth-Saturn Probe: a NASA probe of the planet Saturn and its moons conducted in 2005 by the Cassini space probe and the Huygens lander; this probe was headed up by Colonel Shaun Geoffrey Christopher (source: “Tomorrow Is Yesterday” by D.C. Fontana, TOS1; *latimes.com* website)

Earther: a term used by Klingons and Orions to describe the people of Earth (Humans); some Vulcan children reportedly also use the term to taunt the more emotional of their classmates (source: “The Trouble with Tribbles” by David Gerrold, TOS2; “Yesteryear” by D.C. Fontana, TAS1; “The Pirates of Orion” by Howard Weinstein, TAS2; “The Wages of Vengeance” by Nomad, OAD)

Earthlings: archaic term used by the people of Megas-tu to describe Humans; its usage suggests a certain juvenile image of the people of Earth (source: “The Magicks of Megas-tu” by Larry Brody, TAS1)

earthquakes: seismic disturbances caused by the movement of a planet's tectonic plates or by vulcanism (source: “The Ambergriis Element” by Margaret Armen, TAS1)

Eastern Coalition: during World War III, several nations of the Far East banded together against the forces of Colonel Green (source: *Star Trek: First Contact* by Ron Moore et al, FC)

Ebandane: a class M world conquered by the Klingon Commander Koloth; the people there are known as Ebendani (source: *The Dianasian Gift* by Carol Davis, OAG)

Ebendani: the humanoid population of Ebandane; they have a philosophy similar to that of the Chinese of Earth: if you save the life of another, then his life belongs to you (source: *The Dianasian Gift* by Carol Davis, OAG)

Echard, Debra, Vice Admiral: a Human female; she was made Commanding Admiral Pro-tem when Nogura stepped down in 2275 to protest the Federation Council's override of his decision to increase patrol of Klingon borders following the destruction of Starbase 16 (source: *The Daystrom Project* by Nomad, OAD)

Ecklund, Joanie: a Human female; Chief Petty Officer; a relief helmsman for the *Enterprise-B*; she was given the helm station when Demora Sulu was relieved of her duties (source: “Chains of Command” by Randall Landers, OAL)

ecological sabotage: a crime defined by the Babel accords as “the willful introduction of a lifeform, radiation and/or substance into a healthy biosphere which will lead to the destruction of said biosphere”;

the Klingons have extended this to include selling tribbles on any Klingon world (source: "More Tribbles, More Troubles" by David Gerrold, TAS1)

_____, **Ed**: the bartender in the Melkotian replay of the events prior to the gunfight at the O.K. Corral (source: "Spectre of the Gun" by Gene L. Coon, TOS3)

Ed'riar: a Romulan male; in 2281 was medical technician with rank of sub-centurion; sabotaged singularity drive and stabilizers on *Romulus Ascendant*; was not evacuated with rest of crew of the *Romulus Ascendant* before ship entered Federation territory and found in weapons area; Captain Kirk planned to turn him over to Starfleet Security as soon as *Enterprise* reached port (source: "Romulus Ascendant" by David Landon, OAE)

Eden: many worlds share the same basic concept of a beautiful garden where life was created by a supreme being or beings; Humans call it "Eden"; Klingons call it "Qui'tu"; Romulans call it "Vorta Vor"; Vulcans call it "Sha Ka Ree"; some believe that this is an actual planet from which life spread across the galaxy; Doctor Sevrin's followers set out to find this planet; they found a garden-like world in Romulan territory they thought to be Eden, but all the plant-life used a poisonous acid-based sap which led to the deaths of Adam and Doctor Sevrin (source: *Star Trek V: The Final Frontier* by William Shatner et al, TFF; "The Way to Eden" by Arthur Heinemann, TOS3)

"edibles": Aquan term for food (source: "The Ambergris Element" by Margaret Armen, TAS1)

Edinburgh: a city in Scotland, Terra, noted for its medical schools, many pubs and thick fogs; Montgomery Scott was born there; the Edinburgh castle, once the home of the kings and queens of Scotland, is now a museum (source: "Wolf in the Fold" by Robert Bloch, TOS2; "Blood Is Thicker" by Chris Dickenson, OAB; "A Change of Heart" by Jim Ausfahl, OAH)

Edliw: the central city of Doria with a population of 60,000 Dorians and as many of their nafaris; it is the largest city on the planet; all roads lead to Edliw; prior to 2273, each person made a trip to Edliw to be bonded with their nafaris by means of the day-star (source: *The Dorian Solution* by Holly Trueblood, OAD)

Edmund, King: see "Rendar, Edmund, King"

Edoa: the star system of the planet Edos and the home system of the Edoans (source: "Ad Astra Per Aspera" by Randall Landers, OAE)

Edoans: a sentient, red-skinned race, they are six foot tall tripod-like beings; have three arms (equipped with a hand with three fingers) and three legs (equipped with a foot with three toes); they have bony, ridged faces; speak with soprano-voices; notorious for their reticence to converse, and are extremely shy and unassuming; Edoans worship many gods; this species is long-lived; the society has no class levels; all beings on Edos are equal; it is highly unusual for there to be more than one child per family; the population must be kept down due to the longer life span; as a result, all children are precious, and families are close; ancestral records are kept in great detail, dating back for centuries; some family lines can be traced for three thousand years or longer (source: publicity materials for *Star Trek: The Animated Series*)

Edos: class M planet; home of the Edoans; Edos is not a member of the Federation; it remains in loose alliance with the Federation, coming under its agreements for trade, science, and aid in an emergency; Edos lies in the distant reaches of the Triangulum constellation, near the rim of the galaxy; it is a jumping off point for science teams studying the great energy barrier beyond the rim; it is also a peaceful planet which has never been involved in a war; the technology is as advanced as Earth's; the architectural style of its

cities is strictly functional rather than esthetically pleasing (source: publicity materials for *Star Trek: The Animated Series*)

Edosian orchid: a flowering planet native to Edos (source: "Broken Link" by George Brozak et al, DSN4)

Edwards, George: a Human male; in 2297, a cadet assigned to the *Hyperion* for practical training; part of Team 1 during the Renzalian Madweed crisis (source: "The Weed" by Jim Ausfahl, OAK)

eel-birds: see "Regulan eel-birds"

Efros: the class M homeworld of the Efrosians, located within what was the Barrier Alliance territory (source: *Chekov's Enterprise* by Randall Landers, OAL)

Efrosian Embargo: in the 2270's, the Efrosians were embargoed by the Federation; the Vulcans objected, but were outvoted (source: *Chekov's Enterprise* by Randall Landers, OAL)

Efrosians: humanoids with striking features; olive skinned with white irises in their eyes, white mane-like hair; usually wear beards; they prefer lower lighting levels; originally a Barrier Alliance member race, they have since joined the Federation; an Efrosian served aboard the *Saratoga* as its navigator during the Whalesong Probe crisis; in 2293, Federation President O'run'tha was an Efrosian, and following Demora Sulu's death in 2295, Ensign Grenoka, an Efrosian, took her position as helmsman; offer prayers for deliverance for those who die honorably in battle (source: *Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home* by Leonard Nimoy et al, TVH; *Star Trek VI: The Undiscovered Country* by Nick Meyers et al, TUC; *Chekov's Enterprise* by Randall Landers, OAL; *Insanity's Child* by Randall Landers, OAL)

Egan: a Stradith male; 'short' (he's 'only' two meters in height), black-haired, yellow-eyed; one of the resistance fighters; he became Defense Minister of Stradia following the eviction of the Klingons from his planet in 2273 (source: "Just a Routine Assignment" by Ann Zewen, OAD; "Out of the Ashes" by Ann Zewen, OAD)

Egg, The: symbol and greeting of one branch of the New Humans youth movement of the 2260's; the hand greeting involves bringing the hands together to form an egg shape between the thumbs and index fingers; the emblem worn on their cloaks is an infinity sign within a yellow yolk within an white egg (source: "The Way to Eden" by Arthur Heinemann, TOS3)

egging: Pandronian term for "infant"; Pandronians, being colony creatures, reproduce via eggs which must be fertilized by all components of the colony (save for the component which produces the eggs) (source: "Bem" by David Gerrold, TAS2)

eglon: a Klingon raptor, similar to a falcon or eagle (source: *Liberation from Hell* by d. William Roberts, OAE)

Eglon, I.K.C.: a Klingon *k't'ing* battlecruiser (source: *Liberation from Hell* by d. William Roberts, OAE)

Egyptisraeli Museum: a museum located in Alexandria, Egypt on Terra (source: *Star Trek: The Motion Picture* novelization by Gene Roddenberry, TMP)

Eightsome Reel, The: a traditional Scottish dance (source: *Encounters and Countermoves*, by Nicole Comtet, OAE)

Einstein, Albert: a Terran male, 1879-1955, Nobel Prize winning theoretical physicist; Xon's intelligence is as great as his (source: "The Human Equation" by Nomad, OAD)

Eisen, _____, Base Commander: a Human male; a native of Walven IV; leader of the Tower of Ares movement on Walven IV; in 2292, he met with Spock who was investigating Amanda Bays' disappearance; he assured Spock that the Tower of Ares doesn't take hostages (source: "The Choice" by Jim Ausfahl, OAG)

ejection unit: see “disposal chutes”

Ekialde: one of the two super-powers on Haitz II; has been locked in a “cold war” with Mendebalde, the other super power, for over 100 years; the conflict was ended when the *Hyperion* managed to destroy a meteor impact that threatened to destroy the planet (source: “Call from a Duck Blind” by Jim Ausfahl, OAK)

Ekor: a blond-haired Scalosian male who aids Rael in the installation of the refrigeration unit in the *Enterprise* (source: “Wink of an Eye” by Arthur Heinemann, TOS3)

Ekos: the innermost class M planet of M43-Alpha, a star in the Orion Nebula (M43); it is inhabited by the war-like Ekosians (source: “Patterns of Force” by John Meredyth Lucas, TOS2)

Ekosians: a humanoid race native to the planet Ekos; incredibly war-like, Professor John Gill turned their drive into uniting the planet under a Nazi regime to bring about world change; Gill hoped to avoid the violent nature of fascism but failed; Ekos declared war on the neighboring planet Zeon; Gill himself became the drugged puppet of Melakon; once out of his drugged state, Gill called on the Ekosians to set down their arms, which they did, but only after he had been killed by Melakon; the Ekosians are no longer at war with the Zeons, and the Zeon-Ekosian Union has applied for Federation membership (source: “Patterns of Force” by John Meredyth Lucas, TOS2)

El Aurians: a humanoid race known as “The Listeners”; they have some psionic skills; their home world has been obliterated by an unknown force; very few El-Aurians escaped this calamity, but a few were being transported by two Orion transports which fell into an space-time-energy ribbon known as “The Nexus”; the *Enterprise-B* managed to rescue 47 of them from the S.S. *Lakul* before the transport exploded like its sister ship already had; El Aurians haven’t been very forthcoming about it, but the El Aurian home world is reputed to have been beyond Lyrian space which is located on the far side of the Romulan Star Empire (source: *Chekov’s Enterprise* by Randall Landers, OAL; *Star Trek: Generations* by Rick Berman et al, G)

El Capitan: a monolithic mountain in Yosemite National Park on Earth; Captain Kirk once attempted to climb the sheer granite face (source: *Star Trek V: The Final Frontier* by William Shatner et al, TFF)

El Cid, U.S.S., NCC-534: a *Cochise*-class destroyer under command of Captain Gret in 2294; virtually destroyed in battle with the Tholians at Alpha Tucanae and subsequently decommissioned at Starbase 3 (source: *Old Feuds* by d. William Roberts, OAM)

El Gatark: region of space on the distant reaches of Federation exploration (source: “Valiant” by Ron Moore, DSN6)

El-Aurians: see “El Aurians”

el’ru’esta: the traditional Vulcan embrace of crossed hands (source: “Sarek’s Flitter” by Seleka, OAD)

Elaan: a small, hostile Elasian female with dark eyes and hair; the Dohlman of Elas; she was sent (via the Federation starship *Enterprise*) to Troyius to marry their leader as a peace offering in 2268; it was difficult for her to accept their customs, and she assaulted their representative; Captain Kirk was forced to acquaint her with their customs, and he fell under the biochemical spell of Elasian tears; he forced himself to carry out his orders, and she respected his decision; in 2275, her husband died during the passionate Elasian love-making techniques; she became bored with ruling a star system, arranged for her disappearance, and proceeded to Earth to become “Helen,” a “hostess” for the brothel-tavern Mac’s of Bay Street; in 2276, Ari bn Bem was sent by the Elasians and Troyians to find her; he did, but she convinced him to send a look-alike to assume the throne by paying him a substantial sum (she had

earned quite a bit of money with her new profession, probably because Elasian reproductive hormones are more addictive than Elasian tears) (source: “Elaan of Troyius” by John Meredyth Lucas, TOS3; “Parts Is Parts” by Randall Landers & Linda McInnis, OAE)

Elas: the innermost class M planet in the Tellun star system; home world of the Elasians (source: “Elaan of Troyius” by John Meredyth Lucas, TOS3)

Elasian tears: the tears and other secretions of Elasian women contain an unusual biochemical compound which makes men who come into contact with them susceptible to their control (source: “Elaan of Troyius” by John Meredyth Lucas, TOS3)

Elasians: a humanoid warrior race, native to the planet Elas in the Tellun star system; they have been at war with the Troyians, a blue-skinned humanoid race native to the planet Troyius, also found in the Tellun star system; peace came about when their government, the Council of Nobles, arranged for the Dohlman of Elas to marry the ruler of Troyius (source: “Elaan of Troyius” by John Meredyth Lucas, TOS3)

elasmodons: huge shark-like predators native to Chrysalis; they have two-foot high fins; they’re predatory in the extreme, and will attack anything below the water’s surface; to protect their boats, the people of Chrysalis coat their boats with an organic substance which makes it taste terrible to them; while they still will occasionally try to take a bite of one, beneath the coating is a small screen which conducts an electrical charge; if they nibble, they get a bad taste in their mouth; if they bite, they’re going to get stunned (source: *A Little Family Secret* by Randy Landers & Nomad, OAJ)

Elba: a star system in Federation space (source: “Whom Gods Destroy” by Lee Erwin, TOS3)

Elba II: a planet with a poisonous atmosphere; it is the site for one of the few Federation penal colonies for the criminally insane (source: “Whom Gods Destroy” by Lee Erwin, TOS3)

Elba II Facility: a Federation penal colony for the criminally insane; managed by “Governor” Donald Corey, a psychiatrist of galactic renown; his prison population has never been very high; in 2268, he faced a revolt led by Garth of Izar which was put down by the crew of the *Enterprise* (source: “Whom Gods Destroy” by Lee Erwin, TOS3)

Eldman: a Terran city located in New England (source: “Where No Man Has Gone Before” by Samuel Peebles, TOS1)

electrical field: a quantity proportional to the force that would be exerted on an electrical charge if it were located at a given point; electrical fields are usually associated with the presence of other electrical charges; DeSalle uses one to make a dent in Sylvia and Korob’s “magical” forcefield (source: “Catspaw” by Robert Bloch, TOS2; *answers.com* website)

electromagnetic phenomena: see “quasars”

electron-laser microscope: an electron microscope which utilizes lasers to enlarge an image the subject under observation, thereby producing a hologram as well (source: “The Terratin Incident” by Paul Schneider, TOS1)

electronic lock picks: Starfleet has devised several devices capable of ‘picking’ locks from the simple (such as one requiring a key) to the complex (such as those requiring electronic codes); their usage is heavily restricted, but they are available to landing parties when the situation warrants it (source: “Tomorrow Is Yesterday” by D.C. Fontana, TOS1)

Eleen: a Capellan female; wife of High Teer Akaar, she was pregnant with his child when Maab assassinated Akaar; she was willing to

accept her death, but Captain Kirk prevented her death, and she escaped with Spock, McCoy and Kirk into the wilderness; eventually she gave birth to the new High Teer, Leonard James Akaar (source: "Friday's Child" by D.C. Fontana, TOS2)

Elena: a Human female, native to Serenidad; the fiancée of Jorge Vilas, Captain of the Serenidad Royal Guard; she was killed by the Klingons during the initial attack of their third invasion of Serenidad (source: "The Cost of Freedom" by Nomad & Linda McInnis, OAD)

Eletto building: one of the approximately twelve dormitory buildings on Starfleet Academy campus; it's the dorm where Dean Briggs had his room (source: "Studying the Field" by Jim Ausfahl, OAA)

Eletto Technical Institute: a college, not far from Starfleet Academy, created by the Eletto Institute to train civilians in starship related issues; it was initially just a four-year technical institute, but over time expanded into a four year college, then it added a graduate department, ultimately expanding to a full university (source: "Studying the Field" by Jim Ausfahl, OAA)

Eletto, Adael: a Terran female living in the 21st century; her husband Matt was the son of Giacomo Eletto; she was the daughter of Jorip and Jodhi Ma (source: *The Plumber's Helper* by Jim Ausfahl, OAG)

Eletto, Dave: a Terran male living in the 21st century; son of Giacomo Eletto (source: *The Plumber's Helper* by Jim Ausfahl, OAG)

Eletto, Douglas: a Human male; son of Richard Eletto; he is the spitting image of Giacomo Eletto's long dead son, Matthew, and is a direct lineal descendant of the NASA physician; a resident of Gamma Virginis II since 2274; moved there after his genetically engineered symbiont program was cancelled; he secretly set up a research facility on the planet and continued his research; just as he was finishing up the last of the work preparatory to writing and publishing the paper, a crisis hit: the grain supply of Gamma Virginis II was contaminated with a fungus that made a particularly virulent, multi-system-toxic mycotoxin; people were dying right and left, and there was nothing else anyone could do, so he put his engineered symbiont cyst into the water supply; almost over night, people started recovering; rather than come forward, he hid what he had done; when some people who had been saved died from an antibiotic treatment for an unrelated water contamination, the *Enterprise* crew and Giacomo Eletto investigated, discovered the nature of the symbiont; Douglas was charged with violation of some Federation laws including unauthorized experimentation on sentient beings, and without consent; he was judged by a tribunal on Gamma Virginis II (source: *The Plumber's Helper* by Jim Ausfahl, OAG)

Eletto, Giacomo "Giac": a Terran male born in 2006; he was aboard the Jovian Platform in 2053 as its physician when part of it exploded, killing everyone else aboard instantly; he buried the victims and placed himself in suspended animation; see "**Jovian Platform**"; upon the discovery of the Jovian Platform by the *Enterprise* in 2288 and his subsequent rescue, Eletto re-learned his medical skills by serving first as a physician's associate and later as a resident before being re-qualified as an M.D.; Eletto's father was half-Italian and half-Apache; his mother was a full-blooded Cherokee Indian, and until the day she died, she still called him by his Indian name, Adino Noquisi, roughly meaning "Stares-at-a-Star" in English; Eletto grew up on an Indian reservation, learning the ways of the Indians the best he could; but with his partially European appearance he didn't blend in with the other youths on the reservation; when he moved off the reservation into college and then medical school, his Cherokee and Apache ways made blending with the other students almost impossible; by the time he finished his medical training, he had become almost totally European in outlook; he is literally Leonard McCoy's great-great-great-great-great grandfather (see "**Eletto, James "Jimmy"**"); while

aboard the *Enterprise*, he helped solve the mystery of a plague on Gamma Virginis II (see "**Kahla endosymbiont**"), and chose to remain there a time to work out the elimination of the extra genomes left behind by the organism; in 2296, he was on Kahla II, biding his time, living with Zander Oti and his family; Harrison Davids recommended that Uhura select him for part of the *Hyperion* sickbay crew; Uhura offered him a position, and a commission as a lieutenant; he accepted (source: *The Plumber's Helper* by Jim Ausfahl, OAG; "A Motley Crew" by Jim Ausfahl, OAK)

Eletto, James "Jimmy": a Terran male, born in 2050 to Dave and Lynn Eletto; James Eletto's son's daughter's son's daughter married Leonard McCoy's paternal great grandfather, making Giacomo Eletto McCoy's great-great-great-great grandfather (source: *The Plumber's Helper* by Jim Ausfahl, OAG)

Eletto, Louise: a Terran female who lived and died in the 21st century; she was the deceased wife of Giacomo Eletto; she perished before the Jovian Platform was lost (source: *The Plumber's Helper* by Jim Ausfahl, OAG)

Eletto, Lynn: a Terran female living in the 21st century; her husband Dave was the son of Giacomo Eletto (source: *The Plumber's Helper* by Jim Ausfahl, OAG)

Eletto, Matt: a Terran male living in the 21st century; son of Giacomo Eletto; married to Jorip Ma's daughter (source: *The Plumber's Helper* by Jim Ausfahl, OAG)

Eletto, Richard: a Human male; father of Douglas Eletto; he had a picture of Giacomo Eletto that had been passed down and copied for many generations (source: *The Plumber's Helper* by Jim Ausfahl, OAG)

_____, **Elias: 1)** a dark-skinned Terran male; the father of Dedrick, one of David Marcus' friends in 2264; they both went on a fateful camping trip to Sequoia National Park in the Sierra Nevada range (source: *Boy Scout* by Ann Zewen, OAA) **2)** a Human male; in 2281 was aide to Doctor Lee Cronin (source: "Romulus Ascendant" by David Landon, OAE)

Elkraft: a Traxian male; part of Sheera's resistance fighters in 2274 (source: *Traxus* by Amanda Cassity, OAD)

Elliot, Rufus David: a Human male of African-American extraction; he held the rank of Ensign and served on the *Enterprise* from 2266 until 2270 as a repair technician; part of the damage control party of the *Enterprise* from 2266 until 2270; in 2294, he held the rank of Commander and was an installation engineer working on the *Enterprise-B* bridge (source: "The Doomsday Machine" by Norman Spinrad, TOS2; *Chekov's Enterprise* by Randall Landers, OAL)

elliptical orbit: an oval shaped orbit which can be used to drop into a sling-shot maneuver with ease (source: "Beyond the Farthest Star" by Samuel Peebles, TAS1)

Ellis, Sam: a heavy-set Human male; a member of McCoy's staff; Charlie Evans made him "go away" after the burly man laughed at him; Ellis was returned by the Thasians (source: "Charlie X" by D.C. Fontana, TOS1)

Ellis, Thomas "Tom," Lieutenant: a Human male; executive officer of the science ship *Antares* until it was destroyed in 2266 by Charlie Evans (source: "Charlie X" by D.C. Fontana, TOS1)

Ellison Principle, The: an engineering law, sometimes called the KISS principle; basically stated, "Keep It Simple, Stupid." (source: *Insanity's Child* by Randall Landers, OAL)

Elul, Jacques, Ph.D.: a Terran male of French extraction; a Jesuit priest, and a bit of a troublemaker; he has a tendency to provoke atheists in particular, and apparently abides by the notion that a

pastor's role was to "comfort the afflicted, and afflict the comfortable"; Starfleet's premier specialist in the anthropology and sociology of pre-Industrial civilizations; he had an artificial leg that he used to trick the Dhamar into believing Humans were poisonous; McCoy later regenerated a new leg for Elul (source: "Contact" by Jim Ausfahl, OAB)

EIway Theorem: a theory behind using a spatial fold as a transporter; the process works but not safely; transportees suffer from irreversible cellular damage; work on this approach was abandoned in the mid 2250's (source: "The High Ground" by Melinda Snodgrass, TNG3)

Elyan, Fleet High Commander: a Romulan male; the Warlord of Romii, he commanded the Romulan Imperial Navy for nearly two decades before his death in 2274 at the hands of the Thrith Mask Parasite; has a son, Triann, who is part of the Romulan Embassy on Earth (source: "Masks" by Bonnie Reitz, OAD)

Elyantorvan: the Dianasian capital; a small city by Federation standards; none of its buildings are taller than three stories (source: *The Dianasian Gift* by Carol Davis, OAG)

Elyod: a city-state nearby Edliw; work was underway in 2273 to create a highway between the two city-states that would reduce the travel time by two-thirds; the Dorians were blasting their way through a mountain range where two tectonic plates met (source: *The Dorian Solution* by Holly Trueblood, OAD)

Elysia: an area of the graveyard of derelict ships in the interspatial sink in the Delta Triangle region; some people are still alive there, trapped by the inability to maintain enough power to escape; they are making the best possible life for themselves; Federation scientists are researching a way to rescue those trapped, but efforts are being hampered by the Klingons who claim the territory is theirs (source: "Time Trap" by Joyce Perry, TAS1)

Elysian Council: the ruling body of Elysia, composed of representatives of each vessel trapped in the interspatial sink; the council has been in existence for more than one thousand years (source: "Time Trap" by Joyce Perry, TAS1)

Elysian Council Chamber: a high-vaulted chamber; the meeting place of the ruling body of Elysia (source: "Time Trap" by Joyce Perry, TAS1)

Em/3/Green: see "M3Green"

"Emancipator of Trill, The": Captain Kirk was hailed as such in 2269 for bringing awareness of the black market of Trill hosts to the Symbiosis Commission (source: "The Emancipator of Trill" by D.G. Littleford, OAB)

emerald sand-plains: see "Yas Mirani"

emergency armory and shelter: after two Klingon takeover attempts of their planet, the Serenidad Royal Guard established an emergency armory and shelter in a cave not far from the Royal Palace; it was used by the surviving Guard and the resistance during the third invasion, but it was soon discovered, and all there were captured by Mord, including the Princess Teresa (source: "The Cost of Freedom" by Nomad & Linda McInnis, OAD)

emergency beacon: a box-like device used by colonists to summon emergency help; it broadcasts help through its subspace transmitter; one is included in every planetary expedition (source: "First Class" by Caroline Kummer, OAB)

emergency biosupport unit: a massive medical device designed to provide life-support to a wide variety of alien lifeforms (source: "Transfigurations" by René Echevarria, TNG3)

emergency bypass circuits: circuits which are engaged when a starship's controls are no longer functioning (source: "The Return of

the Archons" by Boris Sobelman, TOS1)

emergency channel B: an alternate transporter circuit which can be used to beam out through a raised forcefield, but only at extreme risk (source: "Dagger of the Mind" by S. Bar-David, TOS1)

Emergency Condition 3: when a ship has suffered a severe power loss, this situation is declared and certain systems (such a recreational equipment, lights and gravity) are scaled down in power allotment (source: "The Doomsday Machine" by Norman Spinrad, TOS2)

Emergency Defense Plan B: Kirk jokingly refers to the beaming of tribbles aboard a Klingon vessel as Emergency Defense Plan B (source: "More Tribbles, More Troubles" by David Gerrold, TAS1)

Emergency Landing Plan B: a contrivance of James Kirk; in 2284, when returning from Nimbus III with Sybok and his followers, he ordered the shuttle *Galileo* to approach the *Enterprise* at full speed so as to avoid a Klingon Bird-of-Prey in the area; upon entering the flight deck, cargo nets were used to stop the craft (source: *Star Trek V: The Final Frontier*, by William Shatner et al, TFF)

emergency lights: all Federation starships are equipped with emergency lighting systems; these are armed before departing a spacedock (source: *Star Trek: The Motion Picture* by Gene Roddenberry, TMP)

emergency manual monitor: located in Auxiliary Control, this station monitors the ship's status; properly initialized, it can be used to take control of a ship in the event of an emergency; the M-5 used it to control the *Enterprise*; located in the domed area between the warp drive engines on *Excelsior*-class starships (source: "I, Mudd" by Stephen Kandel, TOS2; "The Ultimate Computer" by Laurence Wolfe & D.C. Fontana, TOS2; *A Little Family Secret* by Randy Landers & Nomad, OAJ)

emergency motion restraints: during warp maneuvers and battle, the arms of the chairs on the bridge of *Constitution II*-class starships fold down to secure the individual seated there (source: *Star Trek: The Motion Picture* by Gene Roddenberry, TMP)

emergency overload by-pass valve: located on the matter/anti-matter integrator, it allows for the dumping of coolant into the matter/antimatter nacelles; Watkins was killed by Losira while he was checking on this device (source: "That Which Survives" by Michael Richards & John Meredyth Lucas, TOS3)

emergency power cells: chemically powered cells which can provide some energy for a starship, although not enough for the warp drive (source: "Where No Man Has Gone Before" by Samuel Peebles, TOS1)

emergency rescue party: a team of specialists designed to move in to effect a rescue in a moment's notice (source: "The Beggar's Tooth" by Randall Landers, OAE)

emergency saucer separation: in the event of an emergency, most Federation starships can eject their star drive sections/engineering hulls and land on a planet's surface (source: *Star Trek: Generations* by Ron Moore et al, G)

emergency session: the Federation Council may be convened for an emergency session by any ambassador who deems it necessary; if the Council decides that the reason for the session is not an emergency, the ambassador will be censured (source: "The Price of Peace" by Randall Landers, OAB)

emergency shutdown trips: these devices will trip when subspace warpfield anomalies are detected, shutting down the warp engines; they are armed prior to departure from a spacedock (source: *Star Trek: The Motion Picture* by Gene Roddenberry, TMP)

emergency signal, communicator: a button which when pressed signals for an immediate recall of a landing party member whose communicator has issued the signal (source: "Tomorrow Is Yesterday" by D.C. Fontana, TOS1)

emergency stations: similar to battlestations except that all available personnel are not assigned to weapons but to fire and damage control (source: "Where No Man Has Gone Before" by Samuel Peeples, TOS1)

emergency thrusters: the gas propellant thrusters used only in extreme circumstances; they are tied into a different control system (source: *Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home* by Leonard Nimoy et al, TVH)

emergency warp: in Federation *Constitution* cruisers, this speed is considered to be warp factor 8 and above; in *Constitution II* cruisers, this speed is considered to be warp factor 12; emergency warp speed for *Constitution III* cruisers has yet to be established (source: *Starfleet Technical Manual* by Franz Joseph, TOS; *Mr. Scott's Guide to the Enterprise* by Shane Johnson, TWoK)

_____, **Emily:** a half-Human, half-Human female; child of Rissa Hurley and the Klingon Kerg born in 2291; maternal grandparents are Mavig and Herbert Hurley; paternal grandfather was Korrd, the Klingon ambassador on Nimbus III; considered by her grandmother, Mavig, to have cute forehead ridges (source: "Settlers" by David Eversole, OAI)

Eminian Union: the ruling body of Eminiar VII (source: "A Taste of Armageddon" by Robert Hamner & Gene L. Coon, TOS1)

Eminians: inhabitants of the planet Eminiar VII; human (probably transplanted by the Preservers), but with some internal differences; excellent voice mimicry; slightly telepathic; use some technological devices similar in design to that of the Klingons; never ventured beyond their star system; were at war with the inhabitants of Vendikar (the Vendikan) for 500 years, at a cost of one to three million people annually (source: "A Taste of Armageddon" by Robert Hamner & Gene L. Coon, TOS1)

Eminiar: a major star located in NGC 321; it has two class M planets, its seventh and its third; see "**Eminiar VII**" and "**Vendikar**" (source: "A Taste of Armageddon" by Robert Hamner & Gene L. Coon, TOS1)

Eminiar III: see "**Vendikar**"

Eminiar VII: a class M planet, green with white clouds; chief planet of a major star in star cluster NGC 321; home world of the Eminians (source: "A Taste of Armageddon" by Robert Hamner & Gene L. Coon, TOS1)

emitter stage: part of a phaser; this is the area where the beam is emitted from (source: "Soldiers of the Empire" by Ron Moore, DSN5)

Emkel: a Lodahli female; a Seeker of Laughter and Thrills; in reality, she was T'Lira, a Vulcan planetologist marooned on Lodahl in 2267 until her rescue in 2274 (source: "A Serpent In Eden" by Jim Ausfahl, OAD)

Emmerich, Johanna: a Human female; a Starfleet security officer stationed aboard the *Enterprise* in 2274; assigned to lead the security detail for the 10th Annual Federation Marine Biology Conference that took place at the Nerean Institute on Alpha Andromedae III (source: "Gorgon's Lair" by Diane Doyle, OAD; "Barrafluda" by Diane Doyle)

empathic contact: the ability to feel what others feel; carried to extremes in some races, it includes the ability to take on another's injuries and heal them in the process (source: "The Empath" by Joyce Muskat, TOS3)

empaths: those beings capable of empathic contact; one of the planets in the now-destroyed Minara system had a race of empathic

mutes; it was evacuated by the Vians in 2268, but no one knows where they took the empaths; the planet Betazed is inhabited by empathic telepaths (source: "The Empath" by Joyce Muskat, TOS3; "Haven" by Tracy Torme, TNG1)

Empire, Klingon: see "**Klingon Star Empire**"

Empire, Romulan: see "**Romulan Star Empire**"

end-meal: Vulcan equivalent of the Terran supper (source: "Sarek's Flitter" by Selek, OAD)

Endeavor, U.S.S., NCC-1716: a *Constitution II*-class Starfleet heavy cruiser; in 2291, the *Endeavor* and the *Hood* were assigned to perform detailed spectrographic planetary analysis and star charting the Beta Quadrant while avoiding contact with sentient lifeforms in that region; data collected from this probe mission, as well as that of other ships running probe missions of a different nature in the Beta Quadrant, was the basis of the general exploratory missions undertaken four and five years later (source: *A Form of Redemption* by Rob Morris, OAG)

Eneg: a Zeon male with the Ekosian underground who had infiltrated the Nazi party of Ekos, serving as the party chairman at the time of John Gill's death; he and Daras now head the Zeon-Ekosian Union (source: "Patterns of Force" by John Meredyth Lucas, TOS2)

"energize": an order to activate a transporter (source: "The Corbomite Maneuver" by Jerry Sohl, TOS1)

energizers: the units which hold a ship in subspace are called energizers; an order to stop energizers would be like shifting into neutral (source: *Star Trek II: The Wrath of Khan* by Jack Sowards & Harve Bennett, TWoK)

energizing circuits: these circuits are designed to reamplify the amber, pentagonal dilithium crystal packs (source: "The Alternative Factor" by Don Ingalls, TOS1)

Energy Barrier, The: see "**Galactic Energy Barrier**" and "**Great Barrier, The**"

energy fields: the galaxy is still mostly unexplored, and random energy fields are occasionally discovered floating in space; the origin of these fields is unknown, but they are composed of sub-atomic particles, electrons; sometimes they are nebulous, and other times extremely dense; some energy fields are generated by advanced lifeforms, but others seem to be completely random; there are efforts underway trying to tie these fields into the string-theory of the creation of the universe (source: "The Balance of Nature" by Jeffrey Woytach, OAD)

energy transfer device: a Vian device which uses energy to manipulate matter (source: "The Empath" by Joyce Muskat, TOS3)

energy/matter scrambler: an extremely basic (and essentially incorrect) description of the operations of a transporter (source: "The Savage Curtain" by Gene Roddenberry & Arthur Heinemann, TOS3)

Enfer: a Lodahli male; brother of Olmac; an atmospheric physicist, specializing in the plasma layer at the top of the atmosphere; he investigated the legend of the Pillars of Fire that were alleged to exist at Lodahl's magnetic poles; Enfer and four of his colleagues never returned from their journey to the poles; only one of his team, a Holder of the Hidden Knowledge named Filmel came back with a story about how they were electrocuted by a lightning bolt after getting too close to the plasma layer (source: "A Serpent In Eden" by Jim Ausfahl, OAD)

"Enforcer": official name for any Lodahli police officer (source: "A Serpent In Eden" by Jim Ausfahl, OAD)

engineering: one of the departments on a starship; all ship operations not related to command, communications, navigation,

helm, space sciences and life sciences fall under this department; the department is headed up by the chief engineer or the captain of engineering (source: *Star Trek* by Gene Roddenberry)

engineering computer: located in the computer core, one of the computers among the computer banks of a heavy cruiser-class starship (source: *Klingons!* by Nomad, OAD)

engineering control deck: the main engine room located on Deck 6 of *Constitution*-class starships is referred to as the engineering control deck; in up-rated *Constitution II*-class starships, it is located on Deck 16 (source: *U.S.S. Enterprise Deck Plans*, TOS; *Jackill's Starfleet Reference Manual Vol. 1* by Eric Kristiansen, TMP)

engineering core: see “**core**” (source: “Beyond the Farthest Star” by Samuel Peebles, TAS1)

engineering regulations: a series of regulations designed to protect a starship from engineering blunders

Order 42, Section A, Paragraph 15: “Pressure Variances in the Impulse Reaction Chamber Tank Storage” – a conservative regulation penned by Montgomery Scott (source: “Relics” by Ron Moore, TNG6)

engineering station: located on the bridge of a starship, it monitors all functions of the ship’s engines (source: *Star Trek* by Gene Roddenberry)

English: language spoken by most Humans in the United Federation of Planets; sometimes referred to as “Standard English” or “Standard” (source: “The Price of Peace” by Randall Landers, OAB)

engrams: memory traces, physiological changes in cerebral tissue triggered by learning; in multitronic computers, engrams are imprinted on multitronic programming and circuitry boards; recorded on multitronic computers via a helmet which scans the brain circuitry patterns (during the recording procedure, the person whose engrams are being recorded loses consciousness) (source: “The Ultimate Computer” by Laurence Wolfe & D.C. Fontana, TOS2; *The Daystrom Project* by Nomad, OAD)

enRaelh, D'Taj: a Romulan male; in 2281 was Executive officer of the *Romulus Ascendant* with the rank of Commander; when he was younger, the thought of destruction to enemies of the Romulan Empire excited him but that was no longer the case; was slated to take over command of the *Romulus Ascendant* after it finished its original mission; defected to Federation along with his commanding officer, Commander-legate Tacitus az'Har Daktalirraan, and several other senior officers (source: “Romulus Ascendant” by David Landon, OAE)

Enrev: a Dorian city-state; there is a regular flight between Enrev and Edliw; there is little commerce between cities and few passengers, so its use is mostly diplomatic (source: *The Dorian Solution* by Holly Trueblood, OAD)

ensign: see “**rank**”

Entente, U.S.S., NCC-2120: a Federation dreadnought (source: *Star Trek: The Motion Picture* by Gene Roddenberry, TMP)

Enterprise Fencing Club: from 2278 until 2283, as a cadet training ship, the *Enterprise* maintained a fencing club for the officers stationed aboard and for the cadets temporarily assigned to the starship (source: *Encounters and Countermoves* by Nicole Comtet, OAE)

Enterprise, S.S.: 1) a United States space shuttle (source: *Smithsonian Air and Space Museum website 2*) one of the early faster-than-light space ships (source: *Star Trek: The Motion Picture* by Gene Roddenberry, TMP)

Enterprise, U.S.S., CVA (N)-65: an United States nuclear-powered aircraft carrier (source: *Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home* by Leonard Nimoy et al, TVH)

Enterprise, U.S.S., NCC-1701: a *Constitution*-class heavy cruiser starship constructed at the San Francisco Yards and launched in 2245 (see “**Constitution-class starship**”) under the command of Captain Robert April; April was succeeded by Christopher Pike; Pike was succeeded in 2265 by James T. Kirk who returned to Earth following his five year mission in 2270; the ship then underwent a major refit over the next two years and was up-rated to a *Constitution II*-class heavy cruiser; the ship was almost destroyed in 2275 (see “**Serenidad Tragedy, The**”); over the next two years, the ship was repaired and turned into a training vessel for cadets; the ship was destroyed above the Genesis planet in 2283 (source: “The Counterclock Incident” by John Culver, TAS2; “The Cage” by Gene Roddenberry, TOS1; “Where No Man Has Gone Before” by Samuel Peebles, TOS1; *No Cold Wind* by Ann Zewen, OAB; “No Place Like Home” by Nomad, OAC; “The Cost of Freedom” by Nomad & Linda McInnis, OAD; “Interlude” by Rowena Warner, OAE; “Parts Is Parts” by Randall Landers & Linda McInnis, OAE; *Star Trek III: The Search for Spock* by Harve Bennett, TSfS)

Enterprise, U.S.S., NCC-1701-A: originally commissioned as a Tikopai-class vessel scheduled to be named *Atlantis*, the ship was reconfigured as a prototype *Constitution III*-class starship and renamed in honor of the crew of the U.S.S. *Enterprise*, NCC-1701 who managed to save the Earth from the Whalesong Probe; in 2284, it was one of the Starfleet ships that provided support to the damaged *Cooper* and *Shenandoah* during the Battle for Xantharus IV; in 2285, following the destruction of the U.S.S. *Federation* during the Kelvin War, the *Enterprise* was designated as Starfleet’s flagship, a great honor; one of its major assignments for this third mission (2287-2293) under the command of Captain James T. Kirk was the charting of gaseous anomalies, but its on-going mission of general exploration was still in effect; the ship remained in service until it was decommissioned in 2293, due to extreme battle damage it suffered above Khitomer and possibly because the new brass at Starfleet Command wanted to relieve Captain Kirk of his command; in 2294, it was hauled out of drydock and used for the funeral proceedings for Captain James T. Kirk; in 2296, the ship was used during a cadet training exercise using derelict Klingon D-2 and D-3 cruisers that the Federation captured decades ago following the Battle of Donatu V; the crew of a Klingon scoutship that had discovered the derelicts had brought one of the cruisers up to attack capability and opened fire on the cadet ships; Captain Aiglekdos used the *Enterprise-A* to ram the attacking cruiser, saving the cadets, but utterly destroying the starship in the process (source: “The Return” by Steven Dixon, OAF; *Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home* by Leonard Nimoy et al, TVH; “Return to Xantharus” by Randall Landers, OAJ; *A Form of Redemption* by Rob Morris, OAG; *Waiting on Serenidad* by Rob Morris, OAH; *Chekov's Enterprise* by Randall Landers, OAL; “Like Fish In A Barrel” by Jim Ausfahl, OAK)

Enterprise, U.S.S., NCC-1701-B: an *Enterprise*-variant *Excelsior*-class deep-space explorer starship first commissioned in 2294; it was ill-prepared for its maiden voyage and its captain, John Harriman, was despondent over the death of the legendary Captain Kirk and the last of the El-Aurians; he took his own life, and Pavel Chekov became its commander; in December 2294, its young crew was given a battle preparedness drill; with such a young crew, the drill resulted in a 64% efficiency rating; prior to that, no Starfleet vessel had ever reported a score lower than 72%; after a few days of practice, the score was optimal which was fortunate; shortly thereafter, the starship was attacked by a Tholian colony on Alpha Tucanae IV and was forced to call in additional forces to exterminate the threat; the *Enterprise-B*

suffered 114 dead, 78 serious injuries during its first battle with the Tholians (source: *Star Trek: Generations* by Ron Moore et al; *Chekov's Enterprise* by Randall Landers, OAL)

Enterprise-variant: a type of *Excelsior*-class starship; regular *Excelsiors* have only one hangar deck; the *Enterprise-B* and similar variants have three; the ship is meant to operate as a deep space exploration cruiser, but also as a battleship, as a carrier, as a cargo ship; the extra hangar decks afford its crew more options; it can even carry nearly one hundred fighters, if so ordered (source: *Chekov's Enterprise* by Randall Landers, OAL)

_____, **Envac:** a Centaurian male; he was in charge of the subspace field generators of Research Base 1853 which disappeared in 2262 while trying to generate a small, stable wormhole (source: "A Serpent In Eden" by Jim Ausfahl, OAD)

environmental control: a bridge station where environmental engineering is maintained (source: "The Price of Peace" by Randall Landers, OAB)

environmental engineering: division of engineering responsible for the maintenance of the life support systems on a starship (source: "The Price of Peace" by Randall Landers, OAB)

environmental suit: a covering worn to protect the wearer from hostile environments, such as deep cold, poisonous atmospheres or space itself; Spock and Tormolen wore one type of environmental suit to the surface of Psi 2000; Kirk, McCoy and Chekov wore another type during the trip to the *Defiant* (Garth's henchmen wore this same type on the surface of Elba II); see also "**X-E life-support equipment**" (source: "The Naked Time" by John D.F. Black, TOS1; (source: "The Tholian Web" by Judy Burns & Chet Richards, TOS3)

class 1 environmental spacesuit: capable of withstanding 275° C (source: *Chekov's Enterprise* by Randall Landers, OAL)

EnviroSuit: a brand of protective garment, used in the 2290's aboard Federation starships; see "**X-E life-support equipment**" (source: "Never Forget" by Nomad and Elizabeth Knauel, OAJ)

Enwright, _____, Commodore: a Human male; the commander of the deep space station who summoned the *Enterprise* to test the M-5 computer (source: "The Ultimate Computer" by Laurence Wolfe & D.C. Fontana, TOS2)

enzyme recorder: a bioscanner which records the enzymes of any scanned organism; essential in developing medications for alien races (source: "The Immunity Syndrome" by Robert Sabaroff, TOS2)

epicenter: the center of seismic activity (source: "The Ambergris Element" by Margaret Armen, TAS1)

epidemiology: the study of diseases and their spread in a population of people (source: *Waiting on Serenidad* by Rob Morris, OAH)

epidural hematoma: collection of blood between the brain and the skull which leads to unconsciousness; a hole drilled in the head will relieve the pressure (source: *Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home* by Leonard Nimoy et al, TVH)

Epsilon Aurigae: a binary star system some 3260 lightyears from Sol; the two stars revolve around their common center every 27.06 years, and are separated by 30 AU; the primary component is an F0 luminous (Ia) supergiant; the companion is a small G-type main sequence star; for years, this star system was a mystery; the smaller star was unobserved because it was surrounded by asteroid and gas shells; a number of shared planets were discovered, one of which against incredible odds was in fact an inhabited class M planet; see "**Epsilon Aurigae IV**" (source: *Burnham's Celestial Handbook*; "The Beggar's Tooth" by Randall Landers, OAE)

Epsilon Aurigae IV: a class M planet in the Epsilon Aurigae star

system; even though it is literally surrounded by dangerous asteroids, it has been spared from major collisions for centuries due to the presence of a Preserver-installed asteroid deflector system; circa 1630, the Preservers placed Amerinds from Terra on the planet; in 2268, the deflector system failed, but Commander Spock of the U.S.S. *Enterprise* was able to repair the device; in 2275, the Kzinti invaded the planet, using the Amerinds as food; the Amerinds were liberated by a landing party from the *Cooper*, but the Preservers returned and removed the Amerinds, the U.S.S. *Cooper's* landing party and the Kzinti invaders from the planet; the Starfleet ship was transported to a quadrant of space thousands of lightyears distant, and the Amerinds and Kzinti were presumed to have been transported likewise to a different location, but in all probability, the Amerinds were taken to a safe planet, and the Kzinti were sent to their own star system (source: *Burnham's Celestial Handbook*; "The Paradise Syndrome" by Margaret Armen, TOS3; "The Beggar's Tooth" by Randall Landers, OAE)

Epsilon Bootis: binary star system in Federation space; see "**Izar**" and "**Mirak**"

Epsilon Canaris: star system stricken by a holy war; the war was ended as a result of intervention by Pope Gregory the New (source: "Metamorphosis" by Gene L. Coon, TOS2; "The Return" by Steven Dixon, OAF)

Epsilon Canaris III: a class M planet; this was Nancy Hedford's destination when she fell ill (source: "Metamorphosis" by Gene L. Coon, TOS2)

Epsilon Canis Majoris: see "**Adhara**"

Epsilon Crucis: a star system 57.8 lightyears from Sol, in a rarely traveled area of Federation territory, near the Lyndrax star system (source: *Burnham's Celestial Handbook*; "Mark of the Beast" by Nomad, OAD)

Epsilon Crucis IV: first planet in the Federation terrorized by Luka, the Lyndraxian prison escapee (source: *Burnham's Celestial Handbook*; "Mark of the Beast" by Nomad, OAD)

Epsilon Cygni: see "**Cygnets**"

Epsilon Delta: a star system in Federation space with an unclaimed asteroid field between the outer planets; its third planet is class M (source: "There Would Be Others" by Cathy German, OAB)

Epsilon Delta III: a class M planet; a truly beautiful place; inhabited by birds and a small primate that helped McCoy and Spock; the planet smells of pine, but with some faint spicy odor in it as well; its skies are pink; the planet is now under quarantine as the primates are evolving into an intelligent species (source: "There Would Be Others" by Cathy German, OAB)

Epsilon Delta III – *bbu*: an avian species used as food by the primates of the planet (source: "There Would Be Others" by Cathy German, OAB)

Epsilon Delta III – primates: an emerging species, sentient, chimp-like, hunter-gatherers; furry, bipedal, but with large black eyes, no eyelids or ears; they are evolving toward intelligence, and the planet is under quarantine (source: "There Would Be Others" by Cathy German, OAB)

Epsilon Gruis: see "**Abedare**"

Epsilon Hydrae: a trinary G0 III star system in Federation space, 140 lightyears from Sol; its seventh planet is class M (source: *Burnham's Celestial Handbook*; "Q-Less" by Hannah Louise Shearer, DSN1)

Epsilon Hydrae VII: a class M planet ruled by a monarchy; it is a watery world, inhabited by a sentient amphibious humanoid

race known as the Hydrans; renowned for its interesting archaeological artifacts, many of which are on display in the Royal Museum; see **"Hydrans"** (source: *The Making of Star Trek: The Motion Picture* by Susan Sackett & Gene Roddenberry, TMP; "Q-Less" by Hannah Louise Shearer, DSN1)

Epsilon Indi: home system of the Andorians, and the star system in which the planet Triacus is located; an orange K5 star 11.4 lightyears from Sol about 80% of the diameter of Sol and with only 13% of its luminosity (source: *Burnham's Celestial Handbook, Starfleet Medical Reference Manual* by Eileen Palestine, TOS)

Epsilon Orionis (Anilam): the central star in the "Belt" of Orion; a blue B0 supergiant star; 1690 lightyears from Sol; the star is surrounded by a faint and formless nebula; located a few days away from Starbase 11 at warp factor 12 (source: *Burnham's Celestial Handbook, Klingons!* by Randall Landers & Nomad, OAD)

Epsilon Orionis VII: a class M planet near several major rear-echelon Federation traffic and shipping lanes; surveyed for use as a rescue facility and major Federation hospital in 2273; a Klingon monitoring post was discovered and eradicated; has one relatively small continent (source: *Klingons!* by Randall Landers & Nomad, OAD)

Epsilon Pulsar Cluster: a group of pulsars located near the Epsilon 9 station (source: "Samaritan Snare" by Robert McCullough, TNG2)

epsilon rays: created when a delta ray is reflected off an ozone layer (source: *Starfleet Medical Reference Manual* by Eileen Palestine, TOS)

Epsilon Sagittarii (Kaus Australis): a binary star system; its primary component, Epsilon Sagittarii A, is a blue-white B9 subgiant, some 125 lightyears distant; the secondary component, Epsilon Sagittarii B, is a red M0 dwarf which orbits the primary star; Kazh (also known as Qo'noS), a class M world which orbits the secondary component, is the home world of the Klingon Star Empire (source: *Burnham's Celestial Handbook, Starfleet Medical Reference Manual* by Eileen Palestine, TOS; "The Wages of Vengeance" by Nomad, OAD; "Oath of Vengeance" by Nomad, OAD)

Epsilon Serpentis (58 Serpentis): a 3.26 magnitude star 50.5 lightyears from Sol; its sixth planet is the site of the Terra 5 colony; see **"Terra 5"**; the star system has an asteroid system mined by the Kerlovec Corporation by using Delta-Vee units mounted to the asteroids; instead of going to the asteroids, they brought the asteroids to their processing center above Terra 5 (source: *Burnham's Celestial Handbook, Star Trek Maps*, TOS; "Persephone's Dance" by Mike Bagneski, OAB)

Epsilon Serpentis VI: a class K planet, habitable only with the use of pressurized biodomes; the colony Terra 5 is located there (source: "Persephone's Dance" by Mike Bagneski, OAB)

Epsilon stations: as of 2286, there are twelve communications relay stations/ monitoring posts surrounding the 100 lightyear radius of the center of the Federation (prior to 2275, there had only been nine); each possesses a subspace relay computer station and main antennae for subspace communications, fueling stations and even some research centers; some stations feature espionage probes and the most advanced intelligence gathering equipment, but only those near strategic locations; as of 2295, there are twenty-four such stations (source: *Star Trek: The Motion Picture* by Gene Roddenberry, TMP; *Klingons!* by Randall Landers & Nomad, OAD; "The Cost of Freedom" by Nomad & Linda McInnis, OAD; *Insanity's Child* by Randall Landers, OAL)

Epsilon 1: one of the Epsilon stations nearest to the Romulan Neutral Zone (source: "The Price of Peace" by Randall Landers,

OAB)

Epsilon 3: one of the Epsilon stations nearest to the Organian Treaty Zone, destroyed by the Klingon ship *Korvus* in 2275 (source: *The Daystrom Project* by Nomad, OAD)

Epsilon 4: one of the Epsilon stations nearest to the Organian Treaty Zone, destroyed by the Klingon ship *Korvus* in 2275 (source: *The Daystrom Project* by Nomad, OAD)

Epsilon 8: an Epsilon station, commanded by Commander Kevin Seal from 2269 to 2278; Cartographic Probe 712 reported to this station when it contacted an inhabited world in 2273; the station possesses a primate research center (source: "The South of Death" by Randall Landers, OAD; *Klingons!* by Randall Landers & Nomad, OAD)

Epsilon 9: one of the Epsilon stations; destroyed in 2273 by V'ger; rebuilt in 2274; located near the Organian Treaty Zone; it is also near a pulsar cluster (source: *Star Trek: The Motion Picture* by Gene Roddenberry, TMP; "Samaritan Snare" by Robert McCullough, TNG2)

Epsilon 18: in 2295, one of the outlying communications relays in the Federation, nearest to the Beta Quadrant (source: *Insanity's Child* by Randall Landers, OAL)

Epstein, Kyoto: Human female; holds honorary rank of lieutenant; stationed aboard the *Cooper* since 2272; an astrogeologist (source: *"Ad Astra Per Aspera"* by Randall Landers, OAE)

Equine Knocks: equestrian center on planet Gomeisa III which was scene of Kraeuter's Challenge horse racing event in 2273 (source: "Rules of Life" by Diane Doyle, OAD)

equipment belts: a means of securing devices to one's body; Starfleet landing party secure their equipment (phasers, communicators and the like) to belts worn under the tunic; Klingon equipment belts are worn over their armor (source: "The Corbomite Maneuver" by Jerry Sohl, TOS1; "Liberation from Hell" by d. William Roberts, OAE)

Eraclitus: a white-haired male Platonian who often played psychokinetic chess with Dionyd on Platonius (source: "Plato's Stepchildren" by Meyer Dolinsky, TOS3)

Eratosthenes, U.S.S., NCC-3807: a Starfleet transport/tug; it towed the *El Cid* to Starbase 3 in 2294 (source: *Chekov's Enterprise* by Randall Landers, OAL)

Ericsson, _____: a Human male; in 2281 he was cadet assigned to the *Enterprise*; Commander Hadley caught him trying to program the food synthesizers on the recreation deck to put alcohol in all the drinks (source: "Romulus Ascendant" by David Landon, OAE)

Ericson, Leif: a Human male; Viking warlord of ancient Earth who led his people to Greenland and North America; Marla McGivers was intrigued by him (source: "Space Seed" by Carey Wilber & Gene L. Coon, TOS1)

Ericksen, _____: a Human male of Nordic extraction; a red-headed giant of a man; Chief Engineer of the U.S.S. *Lexington* in 2268 (source: *In the Line of Duty* by Nicole Comtet, OAB)

Erid: an Evernian male; scientist and leader of Gospothar, a region of the planet Evern; invented a teleportation system with an incredibly long range; in 2275, he beamed Spock from the planet Epsilon Orionis VII, leading Kirk, McCoy and the crew of the *Enterprise* who were engaged in a rescue operation against the Klingons to believe he had died from a Klingon disruptor bolt; he took Spock and presented him as a Stargod to the congregation of the Holy Temple of Evern; the congregation rioted, and assaulted Erid for committing a crime against the Stargod Spock; went back to his laboratory in disgrace, smashed

everything, and took his own life so that Spock would be stranded there forever (source: *Klingons!* by Randall Landers & Nomad, OAD)

Eridanians: occasionally, Vulcans, being native to 40 Eridani, are referred to by this extremely archaic expression (source: *The Day They All Came Home* by Linda McInnis, OAF)

Erikson, Ted, Lieutenant: a Human male who served as the *Enterprise's* ship's historian following the court-martial of Marla McGivers, 2267 until 2270 (source: "Space Seed" by Carey Wilber & Gene L. Coon, TOS1; "Yesteryear" by D.C. Fontana, TAS1)

Esabl, U.S.S., NCC-1779: a Starfleet *Achernar*-class heavy cruiser destroyed during the Kelvan War in 2285 when the Third Armada broke through The Line on its way to Starbase 32 (source: *In Harm's Way* by d. William Roberts, OAG)

escape maneuver 1: a Romulan ship maneuver whereupon the ship makes a vertical climb (source: "Balance of Terror" by Paul Schneider, TOS1)

escort vessels: a class of starships half the size of the *Constitution*-class, with two-thirds the weaponry, but speedy; designed not to attack, but to warn off other vessels from the ships they are escorting; far-ranging ships; rarely attacked (source: "Escort Service" by Linda McInnis, OAE)

Escri, Son, Lieutenant j.g.: an Illyran male; Chekov made him Chief Navigation Officer upon taking command of the *Enterprise-B*; he had served aboard the *Hathaway*, one of the new *Constellation*-class ships, but had few notations on his record; he was a conscientious objector to the actions taken by Starfleet at Alpha Tucanae, and relieved himself of duty before the Tholian colony was bombed out of existence; he served with valor until being fatally wounded in September 2295 by flying debris when the *Enterprise-B* was struck by the final blow from Arog-Da'M (source: *Chekov's Enterprise* by Randall Landers, OAL; *Insanity's Child* by Randall Landers, OAL)

ESPER capability: the ability to consistently demonstrate extra-sensory abilities, including telepathy, telekinesis, telecombustion, etcetera; exposure to the Ph'eddalyns of the Galactic Energy Barrier leads to an increase in abilities of individuals with high ESPER ratings and kills those with modest capabilities; Starfleet uses the Duke-Heidelberg test to determine the ESPER capability of all its personnel (source: "Where No Man Has Gone Before" by Samuel Peeples, TOS1; "Resurrection" by Nomad, OAD)

Essex, U.S.S., NCC-173: a *Daedalus*-class cruiser under the command of Captain Bryce Shumar which disappeared in 2167 (source: "Power Play" by Brannon Braga et al, TNG5)

Essex, U.S.S., NCC-1727: a Starfleet *Bonhomme Richard*-class heavy cruiser; in 2285, during the Kelvan War, it was assigned to Task Force One; unlike most of its fellow ships, it survived until Task Force Six arrived (source: *In Harm's Way* by d. William Roberts, OAG)

Esteban, J.T., Captain: a Human male; commanding officer of the U.S.S. *Grissom* when it was destroyed above the Genesis planet in 2283 (source: *Star Trek III: The Search for Spock* by Harve Bennett, TSfS)

Eta Cephei: see "Illyra"

Eta Draconis: see "Ariesan"

Eta Orionis: a blue B1V multiple star system 750 lightyears from Sol; its fourteenth planet is class M (source: *Burnham's Celestial Handbook*)

Eta Orionis XIV: destination of the U.S.S. *Pegasus* following the explosion of its lithium crystal assembly; its population is Orion, and rates an F+ on Richter's Scale of Cultures; Kirk met McCoy on this planet; the only source for *draka* nut oil syrup; they

regulate it closely; *draka* nuts and *koza* leaves are found on this Orion-controlled planet (source: *Boy Scout* by Ann Zewen, OAA; "The Difference" by Chris Dickenson, OAA; *bortaS choQ* by Elizabeth Knauel, OAJ)

Eta Sagittarii: see "Denkhoren"

Eta Scorpii: a yellow-white F2 giant star located 68 lightyears from Sol; its sixth planet is class M; the system is located in Federation territory, near Klingon space (source: *Burnham's Celestial Handbook*)

Eta Scorpii VI: a class M planet racked by a civil war which has been fueled by the Klingons; its inhabitants are Humans who colonized the planet after the Atomic Horror; the planet is a member of the Federation; Ambassador Sarek was sent there to resolve the conflict, and ended up severely injured; he was rescued by the *Enterprise* (source: "Dignity" by Chris Dickenson, OAD)

Eta Scorpii Control: a division of the planetary government responsible for maintaining orbital traffic (source: "Dignity" by Chris Dickenson, OAD)

'eth, I.K.C.: a *K'tinga* battlecruiser; its name literally means "sword" in *plqaDK* Klingonese; in 2276, it was attached to Admiral Khalian's first battle group (source: *Liberation from Hell* by d. William Roberts, OAE)

Eugenics Wars: on Earth in the 1992, a group of genetically engineered supermen seized control of several nations; these people were bred to be superior, and apparently their superior intellects led to superior ambition; they began to fight amongst themselves; there was a brief nuclear exchange resulting in the destruction of a few areas of North America, most of Central America and Southeast Asia, and portions of Central and Western Europe; they were finally overthrown in 1996 (source: "Space Seed" by Carey Wilber & Gene L. Coon, TOS1; "The Return" by Steven Dixon, OAF)

European Hegemony: a political alliance on 22nd century Earth; it is considered to be the beginnings of a United Earth government; the city of De Koog (where Demora Sulu was born) is there (source: *Chekov's Enterprise* by Randall Landers, OAL; "Up the Long Ladder" by Melinda Snodgrass, TNG2)

Eurydice: a bar on Netherworld named for a character from Greek mythology, a nymph who was bitten by a serpent and died while fleeing a villain (source: *The Children of Haole* by Donna S. Frelick, OAH)

Eustace: see "Gladstone, Eustace"

Evans, Charles "Charlie": a Human male; sole survivor of a spaceship crash on the planet Thasus; the Thasians endowed him with some of their powers in order to help him survive on their world; unfortunately, once rescued by an Earth ship, he was unable to adapt, and the Thasians returned him to their world (source: "Charlie X" by D.C. Fontana, TOS1)

Evans, Lonnie: a tall black Human male security guard aboard the *Enterprise* from 2266 until 2270; he was on duty when Ambassador Petri of Troyius was stabbed, and caught the saboteur, Kryton, in the act; he received a commendation and was promoted to lieutenant (source: "Elaan of Troyius" by John Meredyth Lucas, TOS3)

Evans, _____, Lieutenant: a Human female; chief engineer aboard the *Lexington* in 2274 (source: "Until We Meet Again" by Shaynna Gitnick, OAJ)

Evanston, Thomas "Tom": a Human male; held the honorary rank of lieutenant commander; a civilian stationed aboard the *Coopers* since 2272; xenobiologist; head of his department; shared a cabin with Professor Andrew Crumpton while aboard the *Cooper*; murdered in 2275 by Doctor Seth Knight (source: *Ad Astra Per Aspera* by Randall

Landers, OAD)

Evasion Pattern Delta Three: an evasive maneuver used by Captain Kelsey of the *Chosin* from time to time (source: *Old Feuds* by d. William Roberts, OAM)

evasive: an abbreviated command meaning “commence evasive maneuvers” (source: “Balance of Terror” by Paul Schneider, TOS1)

evasive action: command meaning “commence evasive maneuvers” (source: “*Ad Astra Per Aspera*” by Randall Landers, OAE)

evasive maneuvers: command meaning “commence evasive maneuvers”; in other words, to avoid the weapons fire of an enemy vessel or hostile force (source: *Star Trek: The Motion Picture* by Gene Roddenberry, TMP)

Evern: a class M planet; only 10 hours from Klingon space at warp factor 12 and twelve hours from Starbase 11 at that speed; first explored by the U.S.S. *Constellation* in 2264; inhabited by humanoids; once an extremely advanced civilization, now declined to feudalism, religious fanaticism is rampant; social decadence seems to have led to an atomic war; currently classed as D+ on the Richter Scale of Cultures, and is protected by the Prime Directive; some radioactive biohazards present (remains from the atomic war which wrecked their civilization); only has one continent (a relatively small one at that); planet possesses a natural radiation shield like Alpha Carinae XIII and Deneb II which prevents accurate operation of sensors (source: *Klingons!* by Randall Landers & Nomad, OAD)

Evernian Work-Animals: monotreme marsupials, two-legged, resembling a cross between a bear and a kangaroo; used for travel, plowing fields, etcetera (source: *Klingons!* by Randall Landers & Nomad, OAD)

Evernians: sentient duck-billed, monotremes (egg laying mammals), much like the platypuses of Terra (Sol III); soft fur; vegetarians (source: *Klingons!* by Randall Landers & Nomad, OAD)

evil: concept of that which is morally wrong, sinful, wicked, harmful and/or repulsive; the opposite of good; most humanoids have similar concepts of good and evil; however, the Excalbians and the Klingons have no such concept (Klingons tend to revere that which most humanoids find evil) (source: “The Savage Curtain” by Gene Roddenberry & Arthur Heinemann, TOS3)

Evil One: the devil (Satan) in most religions; the embodiment of pure evil (source: “The Omega Glory” by Gene Roddenberry, TOS2)

Ex Astris, Scientia: the motto of Starfleet Academy; in Latin, it means “From the Stars, Knowledge” (source: “First Contact 101” by D.G. Littleford, OAA)

“Exalted One”: *Segh vav* Klingon honorific for one's superior (source: “The Wages of Vengeance” by Nomad, OAD)

Excalbia: a class E planet inhabited by the Excalbians; star legends led the *Enterprise* to this planet to search for intelligent life; to their regret, they found it (source: “The Savage Curtain” by Gene Roddenberry & Arthur Heinemann, TOS3)

Excalbians: a silicon-based rock-like race inhabiting the planet Excalbia; they can transform the surface of their planet as needed, and they themselves are capable of transforming themselves into humanoid appearance; they have no concept of good or evil, and conducted an experiment with Kirk and Spock to determine its nature (source: “The Savage Curtain” by Gene Roddenberry & Arthur Heinemann, TOS3)

Excalibur, U.S.S., NCC-1705: a *Constitution*-class heavy cruiser, under the command of Captain Harris until it was destroyed by the M-5 controlled *Enterprise* in 2268; repaired and recommissioned in 2270; commanded by Captain Conrad from 2270 until 2281; ship was

one of the first *Constitution*-class vessels uprated in 2272; in 2285, while under the command of Captain Croft, it was assigned to Task Force Four during the Kelvan War; unlike most of its fellow ships, it survived until Task Force Six arrived (source: “Scotty's Vacation” by Mark Henrie, OAC; *In Harm's Way* by d. William Roberts, OAG)

“Exceeding Urbanity of Edliw”: the official title for the hereditary leader of Edliw and by extension, the planet Doria itself (source: *The Dorian Solution* by Holly Trueblood, OAD)

Exceiver: a circuit of the Beta 5 computer created by a highly advanced society, unknown to the Federation even in the 23rd century, and operated by their Human agent, Gary Seven, in 1967; among other things, it can interfere with complex mechanisms operating at great distances (source: “Assignment: Earth” by Art Wallace & Gene Roddenberry)

Excelsior, U.S.S., NCC-2000: the first starship of its class, a deep space survey cruiser commissioned in 2283 (dubbed “The Great Experiment,” its registry was NX-2000); while Captain Styles was her original shakedown captain, Hikaru Sulu was thought to be in line for captain for her first mission; unfortunately, Styles used the events of the Genesis Crisis and subsequent theft of the *Enterprise* to convince Starfleet to name him as her official captain in 2285; in 2289, it was ferrying relief crews to the Gorn nestworld, which had been decimated by the Kelvan War; Hikaru Sulu was given command of the vessel in 2290, shortly after the events on Sarnac III, and given a three-year mission to plot gaseous anomalies—nebulas, stellar nurseries and such—in the Beta Quadrant while avoiding contact with sentient lifeforms in that region; data collected from this probe mission, as well as that of three other ships running probe missions of a different nature in the Beta Quadrant, was the basis of the general exploratory missions undertaken a few years later (source: *Star Trek III: The Search for Spock* by Harve Bennett; “Never Forget” by Nomad, OAJ; “Captain's Bars” by Nomad, OAF; *A Form of Redemption* by Rob Morris, OAG; “Never Forget” by Nomad and Elizabeth Knauel, OAJ)

Excelsior-class starship: a deep space survey cruiser/explorer vessel which serves Starfleet in the exploration of space and in defense of the Federation; designed to replace the *Constitution*-class heavy cruisers, this ship was originally equipped with a drive system described as “transwarp”; unfortunately, trials indicated it was simply a more advanced warp drive, not a true transwarp; officers' quarters are located on Deck 7; under combat conditions, the ship has the means of carrying three hundred Starfleet Marines into battle; under emergency conditions, the ship could support over three thousand individuals for a week or more; has a 900 square meter arboretum; the *Excelsior*-class starships are equipped with three Sickbay wards; each ward has three examination tables, three operating tables, nine intensive care beds and eighteen convalescence beds; there are two such medical facilities in the primary hull, across the hall from each other; there is a third facility, located on Deck Eighteen in the engineering hull which is usually unmanned but is well-stocked and constantly kept ready for any emergency (source: *Bloodlines* by Nomad & Elizabeth Knauel, OAJ; *Chekov's Enterprise* by Randall Landers, OAL)

Enterprise-variant: the *Excelsior* has only one hangar deck; the

Enterprise-variant has three; the ship is meant to operate as a deep space exploration cruiser, but also as a battleship, as a carrier, as a cargo ship; the extra hangar decks afford its crew more options; it can even carry nearly one hundred fighters, if so ordered (source: *Chekov's Enterprise* by Randall Landers, OAL)

exchange store: see “ship’s store”

“**exec**”: common term for “executive officer” (source: “*Ad Astra Per Aspera*” by Randall Landers, OAE)

executive officer: the first officer of a starship; when the officer receives his assignment, he also receives a copy of the ship’s log, its manifest, its current assignment(s), its current orders, its current crew data and crew assignments; the executive officer is expected to know the material in a short time (source: “*Ad Astra Per Aspera*” by Randall Landers, OAE)

Executive Palace: the seat of the Tellarite planetary government; generally described as a “gauche, bizarrely decorated, and quite overly sumptuous piece of architecture”; the Tellarites find it beautiful, of course; located in Telmart, the central city of Tellar (source: “Scotty’s Vacation” by Mark Henrie, OAC)

Exeter, U.S.S., NCC-1706: *Constitution*-class starship; in 2254, the *Exeter* and the *John F. Kennedy* helped establish the ill-fated Federation colony on Gamma Hydrae IV; in 2267 it was under the command of Captain Ronald Tracey when the ship’s crew was stricken by a plague from Omega Eridani IV; the ship was subsequently destroyed by the *Enterprise* to prevent anyone else from accidentally contracting the fast-acting virus (source: “The Omega Glory” by Gene Roddenberry, TOS2; *The Mindsweeper* by Donna S. Frelick, OAB)

Exeter (II), U.S.S., NCC-1729: a *Constitution*-class starship built in 2268; uprated in 2272; under the command of Captain Ben al-Faisal since 2282; in 2285, it was part of Task Force Four; it survived the onslaught of the Kelvan Invasion forces and joined up with Task Force Six (source: “Captain’s Bars” by Nomad, OAJ; *In Harm’s Way* by d. William Roberts, OAG)

Exo: a dying star system; its third planet is class R, but 500,000 years ago, was class M (source: “What Are Little Girls Made of?” by Robert Bloch, TOS1)

Exo III: an ice-covered class R planet; 500,000 years ago, it was the home of “The Old Ones” whose androids eventually overthrew them (source: “What Are Little Girls Made of?” by Robert Bloch, TOS1)

Exo III–Androids: machines created to serve as a work force for the inhabitants of Exo III; the inhabitants began to grow fearful of them, and began to turn them off; the androids revolted, and decimated the population (source: “What Are Little Girls Made of?” by Robert Bloch, TOS1)

Exo III–The Old Ones: the original inhabitants of Exo III; killed off by the android work force they had created; it can be postulated that they resembled the android Ruk, and were, therefore, tall humanoids with angular features; as their sun grew darker, they moved underground; their society became more mechanistic and oppressive, thereby proving one of Doctor Roger Korby’s theories on how environment shapes a society’s openness, development and social structure (source: “What Are Little Girls Made of?” by Robert Bloch, TOS1)

exobiology: the study of alien lifeforms; a required course at Starfleet Academy (source: “The Host” by Michael Horvat, TNG4)

exochemistry: the study of chemistry of alien worlds; a required class at Starfleet Academy (source: “Time’s Arrow” by Joe Menosky &

Michael Piller, TNG5)

exospheric charts: time-consuming in nature, these detailed charts of a planet’s atmosphere, hydrosphere and landforms are a prelude to colonization (source: “Tin Man” by Dennis Bailey & Stephen Bischoff, TNG3)

experiment modules: automated self-contained modules which conduct various experiments; they require limited supervision (source: “The Royale” by Keith Mills, TNG2)

exposure: a medical condition where exposure to unfavorable environmental conditions (such as extreme cold) results in a decrease in metabolism; it can be fatal (source: “The Enemy Within” by Richard Matheson, TOS1)

exterior lights: all Federation starships are equipped with exterior running lights; they are turned on before departing a spacedock (source: *Star Trek: The Motion Picture* by Gene Roddenberry, TMP)

External Affairs Office: a division of the Vulcan Diplomatic Corps; technically, Ambassador Spock answers to this office; located in ShiKahr (source: *Until the End of Time* by Nicole Comtet, OAI)

extradition: the surrender of a fugitive from justice or a prisoner by one government to another; the planet Vulcan does not extradite fugitives or prisoners; in Federation regulations, if an officer is within a planet’s jurisdiction, the captain will decide if extradition is warranted (source: *The Day They All Came Home* by Linda McInnis, OAF)

extrasensory perception: see “**ESPER capability**”

“**Eyes of Vaal, The**”: see “**Akuta**”

Eymorg: the females of the humanoid race of Sigma Draconis VI who lived underground until Kirk took back Spock’s brain (source: “Spock’s Brain” by Gene L. Coon, TOS3)

Eyrie: the governing body of the Skorr; it is also a Skorr term for a nursery (source: “The Jihad” by Stephen Kandel, TAS1; *Chekov’s Enterprise* by Randall Landers, OAL)

Eyrie, Master of: see “**Master of the Eyrie**”

F

F.M.S.: registry for a Federation Merchant Ship (source: *The Mindsweeper* by Donna S. Frelick, OAB)

F'urgin, I.K.C.: a Klingon *K'Yinga*-class battlecruiser, commanded by Admiral Kor from 2275 until 2278 (source: *Klingons!* by Randall Landers & Nomad, OAD)

FAB 346PLKU278QR: the Federation Galactic Catalog number for a rogue asteroid encountered by the *Enterprise-B* during its search for the *Jenolen* (source: *Chekov's Enterprise* by Randall Landers, OAL)

Fabrina (Cassiopeia A supernova): star which became a supernova 10,000 years ago; the star system had eight planets which were destroyed, including a class M world inhabited by the humanoid race, Fabrini (source: *skymagelab.com* website; "For the World Is Hollow and I Have Touch the Sky" by Rik Vollaerts, TOS3)

Fabrini: a humanoid race native to the Fabrina star system; ten millennia ago, knowing their star system would soon supernova, the Fabrini selected a handful of their people and put them aboard *Yonada*, a generation-type spaceship and set it toward a class M planet in Federation space; the people were ruled by a dictatorial computer and matriarch until their arrival at this planet (see "**Natira**," "**Oracle, The**" and "**Book of the People, The**") (source: "For the World Is Hollow and I Have Touch the Sky" by Rik Vollaerts, TOS3)

Fahd, _____, Ensign: a Human male of Saudi extraction; an engineer aboard the *Excelsior* in 2295 (source: *bortaS choQ* by Elizabeth Knauel, OAJ)

Fairbanks, Tom: a dark-skinned Human male with a friendly grin and easy-going nature that belied his quick reflexes; an *Enterprise* security officer; from 2249 until 2255, he was an ensign; he was a lieutenant j.g. from 2256 until 2263; he was a lieutenant until his death in 2264; he beamed down to Alpha Indi IV with the landing party to rescue Akia; he was "changed" into a vampire by one of Akia's followers; he died when Pike and Number One took over the auxiliary bridge (source: "Incident on Xantharus" by Nomad, OAA; *Drink Deeply* by Elizabeth Knauel and Nomad, OAA)

Fairlight Road: a road in the Old City of Worlds' End (Hellguard) (source: "To Hell(guard) and Back" by Linda McInnis, OAD)

fal-tor-pan: the ancient Vulcan ritual which reunites a *katra* with a living body; it had not been done in ages until Sarek requested it of T'Lar for Spock's *katra* (source: *Star Trek III: The Search for Spock* by Harve Bennett, TSfS)

Falcon Space Lines: a commercial enterprise that provides scheduled interstellar flights for its passengers (source: *Until the End of Time* by Nicole Comtet, OAI)

Flight F603: the Falcon Space Lines interstellar flight from Earth to Vulcan (source: *Until the End of Time* by Nicole Comtet, OAI)

Flight F604: the Falcon Space Lines interstellar flight from Vulcan to Earth (source: *Until the End of Time* by Nicole Comtet, OAI)

Falierk, Lieutenant: a Vulcan male; Assistant Chief Engineer of the *Lexington* in 2274 (source: "Until We Meet Again" by Shayna Gitnick, OAJ)

"Fall of Kang, The": a Klingon poem by G'Trok which relates the story of Kang's imprisonment and eventual escape (source: "Second Sight" by Mark Gehred-O'Connell et al, DSN2; "Oath of Vengeance" by Nomad, OAD; *Liberation from Hell* by d. William Roberts, OAE)

Falla: a star system neighboring Ylka; in 2269, the Federation sent the *Enterprise* to ferry the Ylkan ambassador to Falla (source: "The Kenederis Incident" by Jim Ausfahl, OAB)

Fallows, _____, Lieutenant: a Terran male; communications officer of the U.S.S. *Okinawa* from 2264 until 2266 (source: "Runner" by Steven Dixon, OAB)

Falon: an Orion male; an engineering technician for Cestyr Tyro since 2289 (source: *The Children of Haale* by Donna S. Frelick, OAH)

"Falor's Journey": a Vulcan folk song recounting the journey of enlightenment undertaken by the prosperous merchant Falor; it contains 348 verses (source: "Innocence" by Anthony Williams & Lisa Klink, VOY2)

"familiars": demon servants in the form of animals; they assist warlocks and witches (source: "Catspaw" by Robert Bloch, TOS2)

Fara: a Fabrini male; Natira's chief advisor in 2270; he was executed by the commander of the Provision Government of New Fabrini (source: "Prisoners" by Donna Frelick, OAC)

Faranth, _____, Ensign: a Centaurian male; Starfleet Training Command grad student who took a course on tactics from Admiral James T. Kirk in 2275 (source: "*Alis Volat Propriis*" by Linda McInnis, OAE)

Farius Prime: a class M planet within the Barrier Alliance, inhabited by the Orions (source: "Honor Among Thieves" by Phillip Kim & Rene Echevarria, DSN6)

Farkus: a renowned Centaurian geologist and a rival of Kiliili-Ionono-molono-Iomoni (source: "Persephone's Dance" by Mike Bagneski, OAB)

Farley, Alex, Cadet: a Human male; an engineering technician who was on the bridge when the energy wave from Praxis hit the *Excelsior*; he was seen in the transmission from the *Excelsior* to the *Enterprise* following the end of the mission to Khitomer; he was on bridge rotation at that time; he left Starfleet a few months later when his mother passed away; he was the oldest brother, and he had to take care of his younger siblings (source: *bortaS choQ* by Elizabeth Knauel, OAJ)

Farley, Patrick: a Human male; the tactical officer of the *Excelsior* who was promoted in December 2294 to the rank of Commander, and assigned to the newly commissioned starship *Shiloh* (source: "Spider's Lair" by Randall Landers, OAJ)

Farr, Sellin: a Centaurian male; the best shuttle pilot of the Haralou Port Security team; injured in 2274 by a shuttle crash caused by the Thrith Mask Parasite (source: "Masks" by Bonnie Reitz, OAD)

Farragut, U.S.S., NCC-1702: a *Constitution*-class heavy cruiser; the ship was under the command of Captain Garrovick until 2256 when the Vampire Cloud of Tycho IV attacked and killed nearly half of the 204 crewmembers aboard, including Captain Garrovick (he was succeeded by his first officer); in 2258, the ship was used to transport Doctor Thelins, Andorian inventor of the phaser, from his lab on Dea V to the Arcturus Test Range; the ship was uprated in 2275; that same year, the *Farragut*, along with the *Enterprise* and the *Hood* engaged the *Amonin* combat; after its defeat, the Klingon cruiser self-destructed; it suffered sixteen fatalities and heavy damage to isolated area of three decks in the engineering hull (source: "Obsession" by Art Wallace, TOS2; "Incident on Xantharus" by Nomad, OAA; *Klingons!* by Randall Landers & Nomad, OAD)

Farrell, John "Johnny": a Human male who served as the *Enterprise's* navigator and communications officer with the rank of lieutenant from 2266 until 2268; by 2276, he had been promoted to lieutenant commander, and served as the chief engineer of the *Reliant*; in our universe, Farrell was a thin, nervous man with blonde

hair; in the Mirror universe, Farrell was a heavy, brooding, bald man; in November 2278, as a lieutenant commander, he served aboard the *Enterprise* as its navigator and navigation instructor for a cadets' training cruise; in 2289, he was a captain of a starship; in 2294, he attended a party celebrating Chekov's captaincy of the *Enterprise-B* (source: "Mudd's Women" by Stephen Kandel, TOS1; "Mirror, Mirror" by Jerome Bixby, TOS2; *Encounters and Countermoves* by Nicole Comtet, OAE; *Chekov's Enterprise* by Randall Landers, OAL)

Farsto: a Lodahli male; he works in Small Machine Repair; in 2274, he served on the same Panel of Inquiry of which Chekov was a part (source: "A Serpent In Eden" by Jim Ausfahl, OAD)

Farth: a Romulan male, an enlisted *tirone* serving at a Romulan science outpost on Shirkar's World within Federation territory until 2267 when his base was discovered by a Nova class cadet training mission; he was killed by the cadets (source: "Rites of Passage" by d. William Roberts, OAB)

faster-than-light drives: see "FTL drive," "hyperdrive," "impulse engines," "time warp drive" and "warp drive"

favitit: a plant cultivated on Vulcan for its foliage (source: "Alliances" by Jeri Taylor, VOY2)

Favrils: a religious sect of Beta Reticuli which ruled that star system until 2217; they believe that the universe was created by the Creator to worship and glorify It, with the King-Priests leading; when their science couldn't ignore evidence that other worlds and sentient beings outside ourselves existed, the Favriils, fearing they might lose their power, ordered an immense energy barrier to protect and confine the system be built; they spent all the system's resources on it, imposing heavy sacrifices on the people, who already were suffering with a lot of anachronistic restraints and impositions; popular discontent favored the growth of ideals of freedom and democracy; slowly, many believers began to claim the right to choose their leaders freely and to demand that priests would take care of spiritual affairs only; in essence, the Favriils brought about democracy in the Beta Reticuli system by trying to retain their control (source: "Paragraph 17" by Anna Perotti, OAB)

Federal, The: a Texas-style bar; one of McCoy's favorite drinking establishments among the many that clustered near Starfleet Headquarters; a little too sedate for the cadets and younger officers who packed the rowdier joints on the reclaimed waterfront, but not dead enough to interest the brass (source: "Prisoners" by Donna Frelick, OAC)

Federation: see "United Federation of Planets"

Federation Archaeology Council: organization which oversees the exploration of archaeological ruins over all worlds in Federation territory; the council is charged with making sure that artifacts do not end up in the hands of private collectors (source: "Qpid" by Randee Russell & Ira Behr, TNG4)

Federation Astronomical Council: the organization which oversees astronomical studies, including the naming of celestial objects, including stars, nebulas, planets and such in the Federation Galactic Catalog (source: "Eye of the Needle" by Jeri Taylor et al, VOY1)

Federation Astrophysical Survey: the agency charged with maintaining up-to-date navigational data (source: "Masks" by Joe Menosky, TNG7)

Federation Award of Valor: an Federation award given for bravery (source: "Court Martial" by Don Mankiewicz & Steven Carabatsos, TOS1); see "medals"

Federation Board of Trade: a regulatory agency responsible for overseeing merchants and traders (source: *The Mindsweeper* by Donna S. Frelick, OAB)

Federation Board of Trade Registry: a complete listing of all traders and merchants authorized to do business within Federation space (source: *The Mindsweeper* by Donna S. Frelick, OAB)

"Federation Bosses": a painting on Sigma Iotia II; it is at least seven meters tall and four meters wide; it is a painting of Kirk and "Spocko," in full mob regalia; in the painting, Kirk has one foot up on a rock, leaning into it, his forearms on his raised knee, a cocky half-grin on his face, his hat at a rakish angle; "Spocko" is to his left and slightly behind him, holding a tommy gun across his chest, looking haughty, and by most accounts, a little confused (source: "Da Woid" by Cathy German, OAD)

Federation Bureau of Agriculture Affairs: this bureau is responsible for the ecological and the agricultural development of member planets and their colonies (source: "The Trouble with Tribbles" by David Gerrold, TOS2)

Federation Bureau of History: this bureau is responsible for keeping all historical records for all member planets (source: "Aftermath" by Nomad, OAE)

Federation Bureau of Industrialization: this bureau is in charge of monitoring and assisting member races with the myriad number of problems involved with industrialization (source: "The Cloud Minders" by Margaret Armen, TOS3)

Federation Bureau of Penology: this bureau is responsible for all prisons and rehabilitation colonies; the central office is located in Stockholm, on Earth (source: "Dagger of the Mind" by S. Bar-David, TOS1)

Federation Bureau of Planetary Treaties: this bureau is responsible for dealing with interstellar agreements (source: "Mark of Gideon" by George Slavin & Stanley Adams, TOS3)

Federation Central: Ambassador Robert Fox mistakenly referred to the Federation Council as "Federation Central," no doubt as a result of the stress he was experiencing (source: "A Taste of Armageddon" by Robert Hamner & Gene L. Coon, TOS1)

Federation Commissioners: appointed Federation officials who have been designated by the Federation Council to solve certain problems; one such commission is the Commission on Alien Relations which is working on getting more and more aliens to participate in the Human-dominated Federation and Starfleet (source: *The Daystrom Project* by Nomad, OAD)

Federation Council: the legislative body of the United Federation of Planets; comprised of 100 representatives, each chosen by the populace of a given region of Federation space; as a courtesy, the Klingon and Romulan ambassadors are allowed to observe the Federation legislature (source: *Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home* by Leonard Nimoy et al, TVH)

Federation Day: a celebration of the founding of the United Federation of Planets on October 11th 2161 (source: "The Outcast" by Jeri Taylor, TNG5)

Federation Department of Temporal Investigations: the agency charged with monitoring events which could possibly damage the timeline (source: "Trials and Tribble-ations" by Ron Moore et al, DSN5)

Federation Diplomatic Corps: branch of the Federation government devoted to conducting peace negotiations between warring factions on member and non-member worlds (source: *Traxus* by Amanda Cassidy, OAD)

Federation Federal: a major banking corporation which provides loans to many colonists, even on Nimbus III (source: *Star Trek V: The*

Final Frontier by William Shatner et al, TFF)

Federation Galactic Catalog: a catalog of all astronomical bodies (source: *Chekov's Enterprise* by Randall Landers, OAL)

Federation General Accounting Office: an independent, non-political agency operating on behalf of the Federation Council; it serves as the investigating agency for the Council; carries out legal, accounting and auditing functions, makes recommendations for more effective government operations; in 2285, it reported the *Cooper's* losses incurred at Xantharus to be 'acceptable,' considering the Federation-Gorn-Orion Treaty had been secured (source: "Never Forget" by Nomad and Elizabeth Knauel, OAJ)

Federation Grand Jury: a panel of Federation citizens selected completely at random to determine if evidence presented warrants an indictment (source: "The Ascent" by Ira Behr & Robert Wolfe, DSN5)

Federation High Commissioners: elected Federation officials who are in charge of key areas of Federation interests, but not those handled directly by the Federation Council; they tend to be intergalactic busy-bodies, overseeing their special projects with a complete disregard for established procedures and protocol, so long as the project of which they are in charge is successful (source: "The Galileo Seven" by Oliver Crawford & S. Bar-David, TOS1; "Metamorphosis" by Gene L. Coon, TOS2)

Federation High Court: a superior court of the United Federation of Planets (source: *The Plumber's Helper* by Jim Ausfahl, OAG)

Federation Horse Racing Commission: a Federation commission charged with overseeing horse racing competition on worlds within the Federation (source: "Rules of Life" by Diane Doyle, OAD)

Federation Investigative Review Commission: a Federation commission charged with overseeing colonial investigations (source: *The Plumber's Helper* by Jim Ausfahl, OAG)

Federation law: Federation law takes precedence over those of its individual members; forbids the assault by anyone on anyone, whatever their familial status; it also protects non-telepathic races from being exploited by those with greater telepathic prowess, such as the Vulcans and the Betazoids; it also mandates all colony worlds create immense natural preserves (source: "It Isn't Logical" by Elise, OAA; *Liberation from Hell* by d. William Roberts, OAE; *Encounters and Countermeasures* by Nicole Comtet, OAE; *The Plumber's Helper* by Jim Ausfahl, OAG)

Federation Legion of Honor: a Federation award given to officers of Starfleet and civilians alike; a rose-red triangle (source: "Court Martial" by Don Mankiewicz & Steven Carabatsos, TOS1); see "medals"

Federation Medal of Honor: a Federation award given to officers of Starfleet and civilians alike (source: "Court Martial" by Don Mankiewicz & Steven Carabatsos, TOS1); see "medals"

Federation Medical Academy: a medical school operated by the Federation for the training of physicians, nurses and medical technicians (source: "Nothing Human" by Jeri Taylor, VOY5)

Federation News Network: one of the major news services in the Federation; its primary competitor is the Trans-Galactic News Service (source: *Keeper of the Katra* by Chris Dickenson, OAF)

Federation News Service: one of the major news services in the Federation (source: "Call to Arms" by Ira Behr & Robert Wolfe, DSN5)

Federation Olympics: an Olympic competition between members of the Federation; the events include not only physical challenges, but mental ones as well; the top awards are duranite, platinum, diamond, gold, silver, bronze and copper; the competitions exclude certain races from certain competitions, and some races (such as the Vulcans) voluntarily exclude themselves from the competitions they

would certainly win (source: "The Price of Peace" by Randall Landers, OAB)

Federation President: elected leader of the Federation Council (source: *Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home* by Leonard Nimoy et al, TVH)

Federation Presidential Complex: the building used by the Federation President located in Paris, Earth (source: "Romulus Ascendant" by David Landon, OAE)

Federation Red Cross: see "Interstellar Red Cross"

Federation Science Council: the organization which oversees scientific study and research, especially those matters concerning the safety of the citizens of the Federation (source: "Force of Nature" by Naren Shankar, TNG7)

Federation Science Institute: located outside Seattle (source: *The Dianasian Gift* by Carol Davis, OAG)

Federation Science Outpost 2: a research base on Kumar XII that was evacuated by the *Enterprise* in 2269 (source: "I Grieve with Thee" by Chris Dickenson, OAB)

Federation Secretary of Interplanetary Relations: the diplomatic arm of the Federation executive branch; in 2294, they dispatched Spock to seek out a mediated peace treaty with the Tholian Assembly (source: *Chekov's Enterprise* by Randall Landers, OAL)

Federation Supreme Court: the highest judicial body of the Federation (source: "Doctor Bashir, I Presume?" by Jimmy Diggs & Ron Moore, DSN5)

Federation Undersecretary for Agricultural Affairs: official responsible for the agricultural development of planets (source: "The Trouble with Tribbles" by David Gerrold, TOS2)

Federation Vice Presidents: there are three vice presidents which are always seated to the right of the President's dias (to his left) (source: *Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home* by Leonard Nimoy et al, TVH)

Federation-registered vessels: those vessels which have registered with the United Federation of Planets for travel within Federation territory; a requirement of all ships which travel from one star system to another; many planetary systems require their system shuttles to register with the Federation as well (source: "Dignity" by Chris Dickenson, OAD)

"Feeders of Vaal": the name the inhabitants of Gamma Trianguli IV called themselves until their liberation at the hands of Federation representatives (source: "The Apple" by Max Ehrlich, TOS2)

feinberg blocks: similar to circuitry boards, the careful arrangement of feinberg blocks creates circuitry; deliberately rearranging the blocks can result in short circuits, and even fire (source: "The Alternative Factor" by Don Ingalls, TOS1)

Feinberg, Irving, Ph.D.: a Human male; one of the foremost technical geniuses in the Federation; he invented much of the equipment used in *Constitution*-class starships; many pieces of equipment still bear his name, notably the "feinberg blocks" and, of course, the "feinberger" (source: *The Making of Star Trek*, by Stephen Whitfield & Gene Roddenberry, TOS)

feinberger: spinning, hand-held mediscanner; gives a thorough reading of an examinee's physical condition (source: *The Making of Star Trek*, by Stephen Whitfield & Gene Roddenberry, TOS; "Trapped" by Cathy German, OAD)

Feinstein, _____: a Human male, Jewish; an engineer aboard the *Enterprise-B* in 2294; he was in engineering when the ship nearly exploded in SpaceDock (source: *Chekov's Enterprise* by Randall

Landers, OAJ)

Fek'Ihr: a Klingon demi-god who serves as the Guardian of Gre'thor; he has the head of a beast, the torso of a humanoid, and the legs of a beast (source: "Devil's Due" by Philip LaZebnik & William Lansford, TNG4)

Felecia: a class M planet; a member of the Barrier Alliance; its inhabitants are humanoids (source: "The Wreck of the *Aurora Borealis*" by Cathy German, OAB)

Felecians: a humanoid race with a penchant for poetry (source: "The Wreck of the *Aurora Borealis*" by Cathy German, OAB)

felinoids: any race which can be said to resemble the Terran feline (cats); the Enterprise-B encountered an ancient felinoid in 2295 which was responsible for an isolytic pulse which disabled the ship; see "isolytic pulse"; see also "Caitians," the "Kzinti," the "Laruians" and the "Vedala"

Feliytz: a Centaurian male; a security officer aboard the *Enterprise-B*; he was in line for Assistant Security Chief when Saavik issued a report of negligence against him; he has resented her since that time (source: "We Start Our Walking" by Rob Morris, OAL)

Fellini, _____, Colonel: a Terran male of the 20th century; he served as a United States Air Force officer at the Omaha Air Base installation on Earth in 1967; his men captured Captain Kirk; the colonel interrogated the captain (source: "Tomorrow Is Yesterday" by D.C. Fontana, TOS1)

felodesine: a poison with no known antidote; Romulans are known to use chips made from this substance to commit suicide when threatened with capture (source: "The Defector" by Ron Moore, TNG3)

Feltman, Gary, Ensign: a Human male; an *Enterprise* security officer from 2273 until his death in 2275; he was killed by Lieutenant, j.g., Denise Jenkins, a Klingon agent aboard the *Enterprise* in Air Lock 2 (source: Klingons! by Randall Landers & Nomad, OAD)

Feltman, LeeAnn: a Human female with a soft-spoken Southern drawl; a Southern Baptist by faith; in 2295, she held the rank of Lieutenant and the position of Assistant Chief Science Officer aboard the *Excelsior*; she managed to keep her "smarter-than-thou" superior, Lieutenant Commander Kevin Jordan, out of Sulu's doghouse; usually stationed at Science 2; she died in February 2295 when a drill being used to explore Thor's Hammer on Muselpheim IV hit a pocket of superheated kraylon gas which spewed outward, killing the landing party instantly; a Southern Baptist, she wanted *Victory in Jesus* played during her funeral, and Sulu granted this request upon her death (source: "Spider's Lair" by Randall Landers, OAJ; *A Little Family Secret* by Randy Landers & Nomad, OAJ)

Fenton, John: a Human male; governor of 113 Cancri VII prior to Jonathan G. Keller; he stepped down from office and filed a petition with the Federation Council for his planet's independence (source: "The Price of Peace" by Randall Landers, OAB)

Fer d'Lance, U.S.S., NCC-3301: a *Mugato*-class corvette first commissioned in 2285; her first commanding officer was Commander Shaun Kelsey; it engaged the Kelvan Fourth Armada near Markab; it also was responsible for protecting the Genesis torpedo as it destroyed Rojan's World, the Kelvan base of operations; following the war, it was dispatched to Ziellata to investigate the presence of an Orion frigate in orbit above that Federation colony world; in 2287, it and the *Viper* were dispatched to Xi Andromedae to insure there were no remnants of the Kelvan armadas there—i.e. a "mop up" operation; they discovered a fully operation Kelvan assault/supply ship and pursued it as far as it could; in 2290, it had been adorned by one of the planets its crew liberated from the Kelvan with a giant stylized

portrait of a Fer d'Lance; in 2292, it was decommissioned and Starfleet transferred ownership to the Hawking Institute; the weapon systems were removed, the portrait removed from her hull, and sensor pods and platforms were installed; the ship was rechristened as the S.S. *Burnham* and launched a short time later on its mission to investigate black holes (source: *In Harm's Way* by d. William Roberts, OAG; "Free Market Incident" by d. William Roberts, OAG; *Old Feuds* by d. William Roberts, OAM)

"Fergie": an affectionate nickname given to the *Fer d'Lance* by her crew (source: "Free Market Incident" by d. William Roberts, OAG)

Ferindottir, _____, Ensign: a relief transporter technician (source: "The Ride of the Valkyries" by Nicole Comtet, OAB)

Ferrier, Jean-Pierre: a Human male of French extraction; in November 2278, he was a cadet aboard the *Enterprise* for a training cruise; he was training in the sciences section, but took a turn at the weapons station as well; he did quite poorly in the targeting and firing of photon torpedoes; three of his shots missed the target drone completely but the dummy-head torpedoes ended up accidentally crippling the forward phasers of an Orion freighter that was attacking a free trader, the *Whirlwind*, in the next star system (source: *Encounters and Countermeasures* by Nicole Comtet, OAE)

ferries: space ferries operate between planets which are out of transporter range of one another but close enough to each other to make warp speeds impractical and unnecessary (source: "Return to Tarsus" by Donna Frelick, OAE)

Ferris, _____: a Human male; dictator from the Eugenics Wars of Terra; he tried to program people with his propaganda and brainwashing techniques (source: "What Are Little Girls Made of?" by Robert Bloch, TOS1)

Ferris, _____, Galactic High Commissioner: a Human male; the Federation official responsible for the health and welfare of Federation colonies; he was aboard the *Enterprise* to oversee the delivery of vital medical supplies to Makus III when the *Galileo* was lost in the Murasaki Effect; was appointed to serve as President of the Conference which was to have brought Cygnet XII into the Federation; unfortunately, Ambassador Dah Tecumseh rejected him and insisted on Sarek of Vulcan and the Lady Amanda (source: *In the Line of Duty* by Nicole Comtet, OAB; "The Galileo Seven" by Oliver Crawford & S. Bar-David, TOS1)

Ferrisile Nebula: a gas cloud located in The Triangle near the Romulan and Klingon Neutral Zones (source: *In Harm's Way* by d. William Roberts, OAG)

Fesarius: allegedly "the flagship of the First Federation" commanded by Balok; in reality, the *Fesarius* was simply an Alcyone deuterium gas transport ship; Balok was simply testing Humanity to see if it was worthy of contact (source: "The Corbomite Maneuver" by Jerry Sohl, TOS1)

"Festival": an annual event on C-111 Beta III wherein Landru released control of the general public, and they simply went on a wild, vicious rampage, thereby releasing all their pent-up emotions; similar in many ways to a Greek Bacchanal and to the Vulcan *plak-tow* (source: "The Return of the Archons" by Boris Sobelman, TOS1)

Festus (Lacaille 9352): a small star system 11.7 lightyears from Sol; a red dwarf (M1) with half the mass of Sol; it possesses four planets; its third is class M (source: *Burnham's Celestial Handbook*; "Scotty's Vacation" by Mark Henrie, OAC)

Festus III: a class M vacation planet (source: "Scotty's Vacation" by Mark Henrie, OAC)

field coils, warp drive: see "warp drive field coils"

field densities: a study which is related to magnetic and gravitic phenomena; both are related to the Unified Field Theorem; the *Repulse* mapped field densities in part of the Beta Quadrant (source: *Chekov's Enterprise* by Randall Landers, OAL)

field effect: an energy aura generated as a by-product of a mechanism (source: "*Ad Astra Per Aspera*" by Randall Landers, OAE)

field rations: food provisions to be consumed in the field or during emergency situations, combat situations and other times when food dispensers simply are not available (source: "Spider's Lair" by Randall Landers, OAA)

field training: a course taught aboard starships to acclimate crewmen having difficulties in adjusting to starship life; it includes physical training, some academic review, and even simulated tactical situations (source: "Learning Curve" by Ronald Wilkerson & Jeanne Matthias, VOY1)

Fields, Arnold: a Human male; short, squat; he served aboard the *Enterprise* from 2266 until 2270 as a phaser battery officer (source: "Balance of Terror" by Paul Schneider, TOS1)

"Fife, Barney": *nom de déplacement* given to a quantum energy being by the one calling itself "Gandalf" because it's a stickler for the rules that Gandalf ignores; Barney represents Order, while Gandalf represents Chaos; once Barney detected Gandalf on the *Enterprise-A* in 2288, he demanded Kirk and company turn the being over to him; they refused, and Barney and Gandalf ended up doing battle far outside the local group of galaxies; Gandalf won, due in part to the support from the *Enterprise-A* crew; Barney was put out of commission for the next millennium or so (source: "The Hitchhiker" by Jim Ausfahl, OAG)

Fifth House of Betazed: one of the royal families of the planet Betazed (source: "Haven" by Tracey Torme, TNG1)

fighters, Klingon: instead of shuttlecrafts, most Klingon vessels are equipped with fighter craft; these are capable of destroying even large starships if they go undetected, and yet they can function as shuttlecrafts, if need be (source: "Teresa" by Nomad, OAD; "Just Another Routine Assignment" by Ann Zewen, OAD)

Fikes, Corrid: a deeply tanned Centaurian male; brown hair and almost black eyes; captain of the cargo ship *Oshota*; partner to its first mate, Mike Collins; a topaline smuggler; he was killed when Durit determined that the *Oshota* had been tracked by the *Reliant* and opened fire on the *Oshota's* bridge, killing him and his partner (source: *Liberation from Hell* by d. William Roberts, OAE)

Filmel: a Lodahli male; a Holder of the Hidden Knowledge; he was part of Enfer's team investigating the legends of the Pillars of Fire that were alleged to exist at Lodahl's magnetic poles; Enfer and four of his colleagues never returned; Filmel explained they were electrocuted by a lightning bolt after getting too close to the plasma layer; Filmel himself was found dead a short time later (source: "A Serpent In Eden" by Jim Ausfahl, OAD)

Finagle's Folly: alcoholic beverage; Doctor McCoy was rather renowned for making them (source: "The Ultimate Computer" by Laurence Wolfe & D.C. Fontana, TOS2)

Finagle's Law: the 'folk' version of Murphy's Law; fully named 'Finagle's Law of Dynamic Negatives' and usually rendered "anything that can go wrong, will"; the label 'Finagle's Law' was popularized by SF author Larry Niven in several stories depicting a frontier culture of asteroid belt miners; this 'Belter' culture professed a religion and/or running joke involving the worship of the dreaded god Finagle and his mad prophet Murphy. Among some of Finagle's Laws are: "Any home port the ship makes will be somebody's else's, not mine." and "The perversity of the Universe tends towards a maximum" (source: "Amok

Time" by Theodore Sturgeon, TOS2; *science.uva.nl/website*)

Final Weighers of Evidence, The: the Dandrini concept of the judges one faces in the afterlife (source: "Guilt Gulper" by Jim Ausfahl, OAK)

Finn, Michael: a Human male, an *Enterprise* crewmember; once infected by the Psi 2000 virus, he led a small group of his crew in prayer (source: "Conversion" by Cathy German, OAB)

Finnea Prime: a Barrier Alliance world; the Orion Consortium maintains a strong presence on this class M world (source: "A Simple Investigation" by René Echevarria, DSN4)

Finnegan, Seamus: a Human male from Ireland, tall, blond hair; in 2250, as a second class midshipman, he served as the supervising midshipman to Epsilon Battalion, Company Two; in addition to his proscribed duties of Plebe Detail, Finnegan and his upperclass buddies made sure their plebes came to "expect the unexpected" and "never take anything at face value"—in particular, Finnegan favored the serious, hard-working James T. Kirk, honoring him with the majority of his practical jokes; it wasn't unusual for Kirk to find a bucket of water propped on top of his door, or awake to find that a portable forcefield had been set up to trap him in his bunk; another time, the long-suffering freshman returned from the weight room only to find that his boots had been nailed to the bottom of his locker; in his Kobayashi Maru, he crashed his ship into an asteroid and laughed about it; in 2267, he held the rank of Captain and the posting of Port Master for Starbase 6; on the Amusement Park Planet (Omicron Delta V), Kirk beat-up a replica of Finnegan; in 2280, Finnegan held the rank of Commodore and was the base commander of Outpost 7734 when it was overcome by an alien organism (see "**Organism, The**") (source: "First Contact 101" by D.G. Littleford, OAA; "It's Not Fair" by Richard Dyke, Lisa Evans & Rob Morris, OAA; "Shore Leave" by Theodore Sturgeon, TOS1; "Outpost 7734" by Jim Ausfahl, OAE)

Finnegan's Hooligans: a softball team on Starbase 6 assembled by Seamus Finnegan during the 2260's; according to Finnegan, they had never lost a softball game to a starship crew until they played the crew of the U.S.S. *Enterprise* (source: "Finnegan's Challenge" by Diane Doyle, OAB)

Finnegan's Wake: James Joyce's last novel, published in 1939 (source: "Finnegan's Challenge" by Diane Doyle, OAB)

Finney, Benjamin: a Human male; in 2251, as a lieutenant, Ben Finney was the Personnel Management instructor at Starfleet Academy; he was at the academy an extended period of time, and taught James T. Kirk in his course; the two became good friends, and Finney named his daughter for Jim Kirk; the two of them later were posted on the U.S.S. *Republic*, Finney as an officer, Kirk as a midshipman; it was a great honor for any cadet, and possibly one given to him because of who his father was; given a temporary rank of Ensign, Kirk was put in Engineering; while on duty one night, he discovered a circuit open to the atomic matter piles of the ship's fusion engines; had the ship engaged its impulse engines, the ship would've exploded; Kirk did not report the incident, but logged the matter in the engineering logs, hoping not to draw attention to the matter; but the chief engineer did notice, and Finney received a reprimand and was moved to the bottom of the promotions list; Finney never forgave his former student and old friend; in 2266, while aboard the *Enterprise* under Kirk's command, Finney attempted to frame Kirk for murder; the attempt failed; during his trial, he told Cogley that did not want James Kirk's name to be used in helping to defend him; Cogley wished to resign from his case since he did not seem interested in being helped; told Cogley that after he had gone to the bottom of the promotion list, fellow crew members would shun him and, thus, felt, like he could never fully pay for his mistake; hence, he was motivated to plot

revenge against James Kirk who had reported his error on the Republic; plea deal was arranged where he would serve 20 years, with video contact with his daughter, Jamie, once a month and personal visits twice a year but after 10 years be eligible for sentence reduction upon good behavior and after 7 years be eligible for transfer to a new rehabilitation facility (source: "Court Martial" by Don Mankiewicz & Steven Carabatsos, TOS1; "A Campaign of Whispers" by Rob Morris, OAB)

Finney, Jamie: a Human female; daughter of Benjamin Finney, she originally believed Kirk had killed her father, but she discovered her father's diaries just before she boarded the *Enterprise* during Jim Kirk's trial; brought her father's diaries to Sam Copley, in hopes that it would help provide a defense; Copley warned that in the interest of full disclosure, Arel Shaw would have to see them (source: source: "Court Martial" by Don Mankiewicz & Steven Carabatsos, TOS1; "A Campaign of Whispers" by Rob Morris, OAB)

fire alert: all hands should be warned to be alert for the possibility of fire (source: "The Alternative Factor" by Don Ingalls, TOS1)

fire apples: a type of fruit grown on 1728 Hydrae IV; Peter Kirk tried to eat one, and suffered from heartburn as a result (source: "Lawful Warrant" by Rob Morris, OAL)

Fire Brigade: one of several dozen standard battlestation assignments for non-bridge personnel; simply put, they are to put out any fires that spring up during the course of a battle (source: *A Form of Redemption* by Rob Morris, OAG)

Fire Control: located directly beneath Auxiliary Control, this center is the phaser and photon torpedo control deck; there is an emergency ladder connecting the two centers (source: *Encounters and Countermoves* by Nicole Comtet, OAE)

Fire Plains: a volcanic region on Vulcan (source: "Innocence" by Anthony Williams & Lisa Klink, VOY2)

fire suppression system: all Federation starships have systems designed to put down fires that erupt on the ship, but they are not perfected; crewmen use other fire fighting equipment in addition to the fire suppression systems aboard (source: *Star Trek II: The Wrath of Khan*, by Jack Sowards & Harve Bennett, TWoK; "Up the Long Ladder" by Melinda Snodgrass, TNG2)

"fireboxes": Omegan descriptive term for "phasers" (source: "The Omega Glory" by Gene Roddenberry, TOS2)

"Firebug": nickname for Peter Kirk, given to him by Laurel McCutcheon (source: *A Form of Redemption* by Rob Morris, OAG)

Firefalls of Gal Gath'thong: see "Gal Gath'thong"

firepot: Vulcans tend to keep a firepot in their quarters, reminding them of the flame which always threatens to take control of them should they relax their mental barriers (source: "Incident on Xantharus" by Nomad, OAA)

"First": the nickname given to Commander Penda Uhura while aboard the *Sadat* by Commander Deneice Maliszewski (the *Sadat's* chief engineer) (source: "Escort Service" by Linda McInnis, OAE)

First Citizen: a position held on 892-IV; its function include "Lord of the Games" and "Chief Magistrate of the Condemned"; it was held by merchant marine Captain Robert M. Merrick (as Merikus) from 2263 until 2267 (source: "Bread and Circuses" by Gene Roddenberry & Gene L. Coon)

First City: the center of the Klingon Star Empire government, it is located on Qo'noS on the plain of K'tin'yolth and at the foot of the Kurnach mountains; the First City has many fortresses whose turreted

spires reach for the hazy, smoke-filled skies; the largest of these spires occupied the center of the city and was the home of the emperor and his staff; surrounding this mighty edifice was a circle of other citadels whose owners constantly aspired to—as demonstrated by the size of the structures and the continued construction—change this fact (source: *Liberation from Hell* by d. William Roberts, OAE)

"First Contact": the accepted term for the first meeting of a culture with an extraterrestrial lifeform; the Federation is guided by the Prime Directive and usually only initiates contact with warp-capable civilizations, although some exceptions occur (source: "The Firebringer" by Jane Yambe, OAA)

First Electorine: title of the elected leader of the planet Haven (source: "Haven" by Tracy Tormé & Lan Okun, TNG1)

First Federation: the union of the inhabited worlds of the Alcyone star system (source: "The Corbomite Maneuver" by Jerry Sohl, TOS1)

First Law of Metaphysics, the: developed by noted Rigelian metaphysicist Kiri-kin-tha, simply: "Nothing unreal exists." (source: *Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home*, OAF)

first manned moonshot: Apollo VII which was launched December 21st 1968 (source: *Life* magazine)

First Marine Regiment: Starfleet Marine regiment assigned to Sector One, under the command of Major Mason (source: *Old Feuds* by d. William Roberts, OAM)

First Mother: queen of the ant people on the planet Myrmidon (source: "Q-Less" by Hannah Schearer & Robert Wolfe, DSN1)

first officer: see "executive officer"

"First One": a Ligonian term for the first spouse (source: "Code of Honor" by Katharyn Powers & Michael Baron, TNG1)

"Firsties": a common slang expression for First Class Midshipmen at Starfleet Academy; see "Starfleet Academy" (source: "First Contact 101" by D.G. Littleford, OAA)

Fisher, _____: a Human male, in 2281 was a security officer on *Enterprise* when it encountered the Romulus Ascendant (source: "Romulus Ascendant" by David Landon, OAE)

wFisher, _____, Ensign: a dark-haired Human male, member of the *Enterprise* security section, killed on Serenidad in 2274 by the Kh'myr Klingons (source: "Oath of Vengeance" by Nomad, OAD)

Fisher, _____, Geological Technician: a brown-haired Human male; member of the Alpha 177 landing party; he took a tumble off a rock face and got coated with a magnetic ore; he beamed up to the *Enterprise*, and the ore on his jumpsuit created a problem with the transporter (source: "The Enemy Within" by Richard Matheson, TOS1)

Fisherman's Wharf: a historical district in San Francisco; there is a diorama of the U.S.S. *Enterprise's* bridge on display there (source: "The Lesson" by Cathy German, OAB)

fission chamber 3: one of the power plants of automated cracking stations (source: "Where No Man Has Gone Before" by Samuel Peeples, TOS1)

fissionables: fissionable material; in the backwater planets of the 23rd century, fissionable material is used as a method of monetary exchange (source: "Mudd's Passion" by Stephen Kandel, TAS1)

Fitzgerald, Richard, Admiral: gray-haired Human male; the Starfleet diplomatic officer who ordered *Enterprise* to turn over a derelict Vulcan space probe discovered in 2264 to the Vulcan High Council; he was the officer who refused Spock permission to beam down to Gideon (source: "Home Sweet Home" by Nicole Comtet, OAA; "Mark

of Gideon” by George Slavin & Stanley Adams, TOS3)

Fitzpatrick, Edward, Admiral: white haired Human male; the Starfleet liaison to the Federation during the quadrotriticale crisis at Sherman’s planet; he ordered Captain James Kirk of the *Enterprise* to protect the grain; he served on the Board of Inquiry which investigated the incident wherein the starship *Republic* (under the command of Commodore Jonathan G. Keller) fired on the starship *Lexington* (under the command of Commodore Robert Wesley) during a war game maneuver with its phasers set at 1/10th power (during war games, phasers are supposed to be locked on 1/100th power); in 2285, Commander Task Force Four; he used the *Compactat* as his flagship, and died when his task force was overrun by a Kelvan Armada (source: “The Price of Peace” by Randall Landers, OAB; *In Harm’s Way* by d. William Roberts, OAG)

Five Kings of the Ians: there were five major Ian planets, including Ikkkk, Urrrr, Ynnnn; each was ruled by a king; over the years, the kings became corrupt and became cruel dictators (source: *Insanity’s Child* by Randall Landers, OAL)

five point variance: see “velocity balance”

Five-Year-Mission Task Force: a group of officers who in 2257 set out to observe the interactions aboard a starship; in 2267, they wanted to know what made the *Enterprise* crew so different from the rest of Starfleet, and sent Jude Gordon aboard to make such a determination; they also sent eleven other observers on each of the other twelve *Constitution*-class starships for the same reason; a desk bound committee, they never really came to understand what made the *Enterprise* special (source: “The Lesson” by Cathy German, OAB)

fizzbin: a ruse created by Captain James Kirk to distract the lotians who were guarding him for lotian mobster Bela Oxmyx (source: “A Piece of the Action” by David Harmon & Gene L. Coon)

flabbjellah: a combination of musical instrument and weapon which is carried by most Andorian males; largely ceremonial, they are still a most deadly weapon (source: *The Making of Star Trek: The Motion Picture* by Susan Sackett & Gene Roddenberry, TMP; *Remember the Hood* by Nomad & Elizabeth Knauel, OAA)

flag, Federation: see “United Federation of Planets”

flag officers: all Starfleet commodores and admirals are required to maintain a rubidium transponder within their bodies so they may be located in the event of an emergency (source: *bortaS choQ* by Elizabeth Knauel, OAJ)

Flagg, _____, Lieutenant: a Human male; *Enterprise* officer killed in 2266 on Cestus III while looking for survivors (source: “Arena” by Frederick Brown, TOS1)

flagship: the ship which bears the flag officer or the commander and displays his flag (source: “Fire in the Shadows” by Bonnie Reitz, OAD)

flame gems, Spican: see “Spican flame gems”

flamepot: see “firepot”

Flanagan, _____, M.D.: a Human male of Irish descent; physician at Deep Space Station 3 Medical Center who treated Ensign Dragonov’s injuries after a horse race in 2273 (source: “Rules of Life” by Diane Doyle, OAD)

Flannery, _____: a Human male; crewman aboard the U.S.S. *Sadat* in 2275 (source: “Escort Service” by Linda McInnis, OAE)

flarg: a vulgar *Segh vav* Klingonese word for intercourse (source: *Bloodlines* by Nomad & Elizabeth Knauel, OAJ)

“flash”: colloquial expression of the early 2260’s, meaning “to signal

quickly” (source: “Where No Man Has Gone Before” by Samuel Peeples, TOS1)

Flash Gordon: an ancient Terran movie serial hero; see “Ghan”

flatscreens: large format viewscreens only two inches thick; they can be mounted on mobile stands, if desired (source: “The Cost of Freedom” by Nomad & Linda McInnis, OAD)

Flavin: an Orion male; a slaver/bounty hunter who was an associate of My’Yang; the two of them kidnaped Spock from Starbase 13 and sold him to the insane Romulan scientist T’Rask for experimentation (source: “Shades of Gray” by Chris Dickenson, OAD)

Flavius: see “Maximus, Flavius”

fledgling: Romulan slang equivalent to “greenhorn” or “rookie,” basically a new crewman or recruit (source: “Never Forget” by Nomad and Elizabeth Knauel, OAJ)

Fleet Captain: a position of rank and honor in Starfleet, although not quite as high ranking as commodore; few captains are made fleet captains, and those who are usually have several vessels under their command; Garth of Izar was one such individual as was Christopher Pike; in 2296, Pavel Chekov became another; see “rank” (source: “The Menagerie” by Gene Roddenberry, TOS1)

Fleet High Commander: the commander of the Romulan Imperial Navy; answers directly to the Praetor; roughly equivalent to Commander-Starfleet (source: “Masks” by Bonnie Reitz, OAD)

fleet liaison officer: see “Starfleet liaison officer”

Fleet Museum: see “Starfleet Museum”

Fleet Reef Points, The: a Starfleet Academy freshman handbook; the front page asks, “How long have you been in Starfleet?”; “All me bloomin’ life, sir,” answers the second page (source: “First Class” by Caroline Kummer, OAB)

flemumbi: the Tellarite version of the Terran pig, a thoroughly disgusting animal to view, but regarded by many as delicious (source: “Scotty’s Vacation” by Mark Henrie, OAC)

flex-wrap: an insulating material usually wrapped around flexible cables aboard a starship (source: “Fairy Tale Ending” by Joanne K. Seward, OAB)

fli’plai: Vulcan term for paper (source: *Keeper of the Katra* by Chris Dickenson, OAF)

flight deck: see “hangar deck”

Flight Operations: a division of Klingon High Command (Klingon Imperial Battle Fleet’s version of the Federation’s Starfleet Operations) (source: *Klingons!* by Randall Landers & Nomad, OAD)

flight recorder: also known as a “recorder marker”; this is a “black box” which contains information and images from various critical areas of a starship; Kirk launched this device toward Earth once the *Fesarius* had captured the *Enterprise*; the device was subsequently destroyed; decades later, he used the flight recorder from Engineering to discover that Spock had placed his *katra* in McCoy (source: “The Corbomite Maneuver” by Jerry Sohl, TOS1; *Star Trek III: The Search for Spock* by Harve Bennett, TSfS)

flimsies: plasticine “hard copies” – similar to paper, but made of a plastic material; completely reusable through recycling (source: “Command Potential” by Donna S. Frelick, OAA)

Flint: see “Akharin”

flintlock: a muzzle-loading firearm which uses a chemical explosion to propel a projectile; the Klingon Krell distributed them to the Village

People of Neural in order to try to take control of the planet; the civil war which erupted ended up with the entire planet's population being killed (source: "A Private Little War" by Gene Roddenberry, TOS2; "The Last Survivor" by Nomad, OAD)

"flitter": colloquial expression for a hover-car (source: *Boy Scout* by Ann Zewen, OAA)

"flop": an early 20th century expression for a place to sleep (source: "The City on the Edge of Forever" by Harlan Ellison, TOS1)

Flores, Marita: a Human female; a weapons technician aboard the *Farragut* in 2254; part of the first landing party commanded by Lieutenant Kirk to Chi Capricorni II; she was injured during a firefight with Tellarites who had taken over the mines (source: "Command Potential" by Donna S. Frelick, OAA)

flow capacitor: a component of an antigrav, failure of which can cause an antigrav to fail (source: "Hollow Pursuits" by Sally Caves, TNG3)

flow regulators: units that control the input of matter and antimatter into a warp drive (source: *Star Trek: The Motion Picture* by Gene Roddenberry, TMP)

flow sensors: monitor the antimatter bleeders as they introduce the volatile substance into the intermix chamber (source: *Star Trek: The Motion Picture* by Gene Roddenberry, TMP)

Floyd's Barber Shop: a business located near the Twenty-First Street mission in 1930 on Earth (source: "The City on the Edge of Forever" by Harlan Ellison, TOS1)

Flyer: a Kzinti male; one of the Kzinti who captured an *Enterprise* shuttlecraft in 2270; he was killed when his captain tried to force a weapon they found in a slaver box the shuttlecraft was transporting to reveal a total conversion weapon (the weapon's computer activated the self-destruct mechanism) (source: "The Slaver Weapon" by Larry Niven, TAS1)

Flying Belt, Slaver: the discovery of this device in a stasis box led to the invention of artificial gravity (source: "The Slaver Weapon" by Larry Niven, TAS1)

flying parasites: see "Blastoneurons"

Flying Sandbats of Manark IV: see "Manark IV-sandbats"

Flying Whore, The: a small cabin cruiser owned by Marnita Martina until its destruction at the hands of My'Yang's ship, the *Vagabond*; she won the ship in a card game (source: "Shades of Gray" by Chris Dickenson, OAD)

flypaper: a porous paper coated with a sticky substance; Spock compared the Alcyone buoy to flypaper (source: "The Corbomite Maneuver" by Jerry Sohl, TOS1)

Foleasik: the false identity of a shuttle pilot assumed by Corrid Fikes (source: *Liberation from Hell* by d. William Roberts, OAE)

Foley, _____, Yeoman: a Human male; an engineer aboard the U.S.S. *Samson* when it was almost destroyed by the Kelvan invasion armada in 2285; he was able to repair a damaged Kelvan fighter, and used it to tow the *Samson* back toward Federation space; in 2287, he was a lieutenant and the chief engineer of the *Fer d'Lance* (source: *In Harm's Way* by d. William Roberts, OAG; "Free Market Incident" by d. William Roberts, OAG)

Follies Merindol: one of the best music halls on Merindol (source: "The Ride of the Valkyries" by Nicole Comtet, OAB)

Folsom culture: 10,000-25,000 year old hunter culture whose members inhabited a large part of North America east of the Rocky

Mountains (source: "The Galileo Seven" by Oliver Crawford & S. Bar-David, TOS1)

Folsom man: an individual of the Folsom culture (source: "The Galileo Seven" by Oliver Crawford & S. Bar-David, TOS1)

Folsom point: a flint point stone blade carefully constructed; important archaeological find in 1926 in Folsom, New Mexico (source: "The Galileo Seven" by Oliver Crawford & S. Bar-David, TOS1)

food dispensers: the location to which a ship's food processor unit sends its prepared food items; on *Constitution*-class vessels, these resemble sliding door slots in the wall (source: "Tomorrow Is Yesterday" by D.C. Fontana, TOS2)

food packs: most starships are equipped with synthesizers which contain a wide variety of cuisines programmed therein; customarily, Klingon ships predominantly feature Klingon cuisine, Federation ships predominantly feature a variety of foodstuffs available on the myriad Federation worlds, Romulan ships feature Romulan cuisine; the food packs may be reprogrammed to have the food synthesizers create a different type of food (source: *Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home* by Leonard Nimoy et al, OAF)

food processor unit: a device aboard a Federation starship that can be used to select one's choice of meals from a limited selection; some items are synthesized from organic material; some items are defrosted and served; the unit does not use replicator technology (source: *Mr. Scott's Guide to the Enterprise* by Shane Johnson, TVH)

food servitor: see "food processor unit"

food slots: see "food dispensers"

food synthesizers: some of the food aboard Federation vessels is synthesized, and these units produce the food which is consumed; they must be reprogrammed to account for varied metabolisms (such as the Klingons which came aboard the *Enterprise* in 2269); these synthesizers also produce plates, cups, glasses and utensils; see also "galley" (source: "Day of the Dove" by Jerome Bixby, TOS3)

"foolie": an Only slang term for a game; see "Only slang" (source: "Miri" by Adrian Spies, TOS1)

football: a Terran sport still played in the 23rd century (source: "A Family Holiday Surprise" by Selek, Saidicam, and T'Lea, OAA)

Forbidden Planet: a movie viewed in the holoivid theater aboard the *Cooper* from time to time (source: "Return to Xantharus" by Randall Landers, OAJ)

Forcas: a star system in Klingon space (source: "Parallels" by Brannon Braga, TNG7)

Forcas III: a class M planet in Klingon space (source: "Parallels" by Brannon Braga, TNG7)

Forcas ale: a beige-colored drink that most non-Klingons find revolting (source: *Star Trek: Generations* by Rick Berman et al, GEN)

Force 7 wave: a powerful sea or ocean wave, usually generated by a powerful storm (source: *A Little Family Secret* by Randy Landers & Nomad, OAJ)

Force 8 gale: a gale-force wind (source: *A Little Family Secret* by Randy Landers & Nomad, OAJ)

force field: firm, transparent wall of electromagnetic energy or nucleonic force used as a barrier by most advanced races; Federation starships are equipped with force fields in their brigs to prevent prisoner escapes; the ship is protected by both force fields and deflector shields; force fields also bring matter to fuel the engines (some is converted to antimatter; some is not, and the two are mixed

in the intermix chamber) (source: *Star Trek* by Gene Roddenberry, TOS)

force field generators: mechanisms which are designed to create force fields; on *Constitution* and *Constitution II* starships, they are located in the forward section of the engineering hull (source: "The Survivor" by James Schmerer, TAS1)

forced-spectrum communication: a way of forcing visual communications onto an unwilling receiver; the clarity of the image leaves much to be desired (source: "Samaritan Snare" by Robert McCullough, TNG2)

Ford, Whitey: a Terran male; a left handed pitcher who pitched for the New York Yankees in the 20th century; comparatively small in stature; Chekov had received his baseball card from his uncle Vanya (source: "Finnegan's Challenge" by Diane Doyle, OAB)

Forensic Pathology: a course taught as a part of at Starfleet Academy's medical curriculum in which evidence from a cadaver is used to deduce the cause of death (source: "A Serpent In Eden" by Jim Ausfahl, OAD)

Forkes, _____, Lieutenant: a Human male; a command officer serving aboard the *Chosin* in 2294 and 2295; he occasionally mans the sciences station (source: *Old Feuds* by d. William Roberts, OAM)

Forlyn: the Tellarite name for the star Sol (source: *In Harm's Way* by d. William Roberts, OAG)

Formation L: a landing party formation used when the landing party is under attack by force(s) unknown and when approaching a possible source of danger; one of several formations used (source: "The Apple" by Max Ehrlich, TOS2; "The Red Shirt" by Ann Zewen, OAB)

formax: a chemical compound; antidote for the neural poison Janice Lester gave to James Kirk on Starbase 11 in 2269 (source: "Turnabout Vengeance" by Nomad, OAB)

formazine: a chemical stimulant for humanoids; McCoy overdosed Hanar on the drug to make him extremely irritable (source: "By Any Other Name" by Jerome Bixby, TOS2)

Fornad the Third: a Trinarian male; in 2274, he became the new king of Trinar V; took a liking to Captain Kirk, and signed an agreement to join the Federation following his coronation because the Kh'teb Klingons present became drunk and disorderly (*Enterprise* security personnel efficiently handled the Kh'teb warriors); stipulated that Federation Ambassador Charles F. Grant be removed from the planet before he would sign the document (source: "The Cost of Freedom" by Nomad & Linda McInnis, OAD)

Forrester, Kelly, Lieutenant: a Human female; communications officer of the *Enterprise*, 2249-2263 (source: "Incident on Xantharus" by Nomad, OAA)

forward observation deck: located on F Deck of the *Enterprise-A*, this large area allowed the crew a view of the stars before them; there is an emergency transporter beacon located in the middle of the deck floor, concealed below the deck; the quantum energy being Gandalf once led a jam session in this facility (source: *The Plumber's Helper* by Jim Ausfahl, OAG; "The Hitchhiker" by Jim Ausfahl, OAG; *Star Trek V: The Final Frontier* by William Shatner et al, TFF)

forward recreation room: located on Deck 6 of *Excelsior*-class starships; this large area allowed the crew a view of the stars before them; there is an emergency transporter beacon located in the middle of the deck floor, concealed below the deck (source: *bortaS choQ* by Elizabeth Knauel, OAJ)

forward recreation deck: see "forward recreation room"

Foster, Jake, Lieutenant: a Human male; Chief Security Officer of the *Shenandoah* in 2264; one of the heaviest Human males to serve in Starfleet outside a heavy-gravity planet-born Human; he was killed by Q'xI% (source: "Spider's Lair" by Randall Landers, OAA)

Foster, Megan: a Terran female; a Starfleet intelligence officer with the rank of lieutenant, junior grade; in 2259, she was disguised to look like an Orion and worked in a brothel in the Centa district of the city of Gracchos on the planet Xantharus; she was caught by Xeron, one of the Director of the Barrier Alliance Consortium's men, and tortured into revealing information about the Starfleet Intelligence network on Xantharus; she was literally torn to pieces by the vicious Marina and died horribly (source: *Remember the Hood* by Nomad & Elizabeth Knauel, OAA)

Four Deities, The: the Betazoid religious concept calls for four deities (source: "Manhunt" by Terry Devereaux, TNG2)

"Four R's, The": rest, recreation, repairs and replacements; something that every starship needs from time to time (source: "Angel Face" by Nomad, OAB)

"four-three": 23rd century slang for quadrotriticale (source: *The Children of Haole* by Donna S. Frelick, OAH)

Fox, Robert: a Human male; Ambassador-at-Large; negotiated the settlement of Eminiar VII and Vendikar's conflict in 2267; in 2271, assigned to Starbase 73; in 2275, he came aboard the *Enterprise* to present Starfleet's case to the Federation Council so that he could gain their permission to approach the Organians with the Klingon problem; the Federation Council was unmoved, and refused to allow the Organians to become involved with what was thought by the "Peacemaker" contingent to be Starfleet's exaggeration of a few minor, unrelated incidents (source: "A Taste of Armageddon" by Robert Hamner & Gene L. Coon, TOS1; *Klingons!* by Randall Landers & Nomad, OAD)

fr'X'ta: the name of Kruge's *Saj* (source: "Tryst" by Linda McInnis, OAE)

fral: the Tellarite equivalent of maize (corn) (source: "Scotty's Vacation" by Mark Henrie, OAC)

framarts: an aviary predatory species native to Tellar; extremely large, resembling a small bobcat with a huge set of wings (source: "Scotty's Vacation" by Mark Henrie, OAC)

Francisco, Sebastian, Inspector: a Human male native to Chrysalis; a member of the Chrysalis vice squad (source: *A Little Family Secret* by Randy Landers & Nomad, OAJ)

Franklin: a Federation diplomatic courier (source: *Chekov's Enterprise* by Randall Landers, OAL)

Franklin, Benjamin "Ben," Ensign: a very "laid back" Human male born in 2253; second navigation officer of the *Cooper* since 2272; works during the first shift; he was one of Paul Freeman's students at Starfleet Academy; by 2295, he held the rank of Lieutenant; all his commanding officers (Captains Williams, Sulu and Xon) tolerated his lack of motivation (source: "Ad Astra Per Aspera" by Randall Landers, OAE; "Return to Xantharus" by Randall Landers, OAJ; *A Little Family Secret* by Randy Landers & Nomad, OAJ)

Franklin, Matt, Ensign: a Human male; an engineer aboard the U.S.S. *Jenolen* when it disappeared and was presumed destroyed in 2294 (source: "Relics" by Ron Moore, TNG5)

fraternization: relationships between the officers and crew of a Federation starship are acceptable so long as they do not interfere with the duties of all involved, even peripherally (source: "Elogium" by Jeri Taylor et al, VOY2)

Free Market: a class M planet located in the Xi Andromeda system near the Federation, the Gorn Confederation and Barrier Alliance territory; it was set up to be the trading places of trading places for the newly expanded Federation, somewhat like the New York Stock Exchange or Wall Street of 20th century Earth; it had a population of 2,000,000 at any given time; in 2285, during the Kelvan War, it was invaded and occupied by a Kelvan force; no subspace communications were received from the world after that time; in 2287, Starfleet forces liberated the planet, there were less than 50 among the living there, 40 of whom were on an asteroid mining dilithium for the Kelvans; there were at least a thousand who were taken by the Kelvan assault/support ship fleeing to the far side of the Beta Quadrant (source: "Free Market Incident" by d. William Roberts, OAG)

Free Traders: a loose association of merchants who do not abide by Federation regulations (source: *Liberation from Hell* by d. William Roberts, OAE)

Free Trading Brother: a respectful means of addressing a fellow free trader (source: *Liberation from Hell* by d. William Roberts, OAE)

Free Traders Shipping: a trading consortium operating in the Triangle; the Romulan Commander Di'on is a part of its operations (source: *Encounters and Countermoves* by Nicole Comtet, OAE)

free-fall handball: see "low-gravity handball"

Freed, Carl: a Human male; the chief aide to Bill Bradley on Axanar; served a prison term for aiding a smuggling operation (source: "The Salos Sellout" by Thomas Harden, OAB)

Freeman, Paul: a Human male; *Enterprise* officer with the rank of ensign from 2266 until 2270; he was in Rec Room 5 during the Psi 2000 virus, watching his then girlfriend Angela Moretti do a strip tease for the crew there; she left him shortly afterwards; Kirk asked him if he had started the fight aboard K-7 (he hadn't); Freeman and Sulu have never been on the best of terms, stemming from a disagreement over one Lieutenant Karen Lang and a reprimand on her record, a reprimand Freeman felt Sulu should have received instead; from 2270 until 2273, he served as an instructor at Starfleet Academy; in 2284, he held the rank of Commander and the position of captain of the U.S.S. *Shenandoah*; the U.S.S. *Shenandoah* which was involved in the Orion-Gorn-Federation Peace Accords on Xantharus (as well as the Battle for Xantharus IV) in 2284; Freeman had secret orders during that fateful mission, given to him by Admiral Cartwright himself: the *Cooper*, with its civilians aboard, was to be protected at all costs; unfortunately, the *Cooper* suffered 50 casualties while his own ship, the *Shenandoah*, only suffered two; in 2286, he was made the captain of the *Hathaway*, his executive was Saavik; they did not get along, and he had her transferred off his ship (source: "Angel Face" by Nomad, OAB; "Plague!" by Randall Landers, OAB; "The Trouble with Tribbles" by David Gerrold, TOS2; "Return to Xantharus" by Randall Landers, OAJ; *Chekov's Enterprise* by Randall Landers, OAL)

Freimensch, _____, M.D.: a Human; a psychiatrist who testified for the prosecution in Benjamin Finney's trial; believes that if Finney were too insane to be responsible for his actions, he would have had a noticeable flaw in his plan; agreed with fellow psychiatrist in that opinion (source: "A Campaign of Whispers" by Rob Morris, OAB)

Frensa, Michael "Mike": a Human male; an engineering cadet aboard the *Enterprise-A* in 2288; he was feverish (39.5° C) with a rash consisting of small, reddish-purple blotches on his body; Doctor Eletto diagnosed it as Rigelian Fever; the doctor was right; Frensa had a friend from Rigel VII whom he had recently visited; in 2296, he was part of Starfleet Academy; he broke his hip during a cadet training exercise and was ferried from the *Enterprise-A* to the *Hyperion* aboard the *Ithaca* (source: *The Plumber's Helper* by Jim Ausfahl, OAG; "Like

Fish In A Barrel" by Jim Ausfahl, OAK)

Freesia: a class M planet; a Federation member world; in 2267, the planet was wracked by global weather changes, including flooding on a massive level (source: "Only So Much" by Cathy German, OAB)

Freesians: a humanoid race; Federation members; in 2267, their planet was wracked by global weather changes, including flooding on a massive level; they sent a distress call which was picked up by the *Enterprise*; McCoy nearly drowned in one operation to strengthen a dam (source: "Only So Much" by Cathy German, OAB)

Frenchotte: a Romulan male; self-exiled musical composer now residing in Federation space (source: "Playing God" by Jim Trombetta, DSN2)

frequency column: see "subspace log"

Fried, Pam: a Human female; originally a nurse stationed aboard the *Enterprise* in 2266 (source: "To Coin a Phrase" by Randall Landers, OAB)

"Friendly Angel": see "Gorgon, The"

friendship messages: usually broadcast in linguacode, these messages relate the friendly intent of the Federation and its peoples (source: *Star Trek: The Motion Picture* by Gene Roddenberry, TMP)

frigate: a Federation vessel more heavily armed than a heavy cruiser; there are several classes of Federation frigates, built along similar lines, including the *Miranda* (also known as the *Reliant*-variant) and the *Soyuz*-variant (source: *Star Trek II: The Wrath of Khan* by Jack Sowards & Harve Bennett, TWoK)

Fritz, Hilary: a Human female from Southern California; petite in build, with dirty blond hair; in 2272 was a tour guide on the Himmelstrassenbahn Sky Tour on Centaurus; was a long time close friend of Lieutenant Marcella Marsilii, an Academy classmate of Pavel Chekov's, since before high school (source: "Ski Vacation on Centaurus" by Diane Doyle, OAC)

"From Out of Nowhere": a Terran song of obscure origin, circa 1930 (source: "The City on the Edge of Forever" by Harlan Ellison, TOS1)

Frontier-model Colt: popular revolver of 1880's on Earth; the Melkotians equipped the *Enterprise* landing party with these pistols; described by Spock as crude, but as deadly as a phaser at close range (source: "Spectre of the Gun" by Gene L. Coon, TOS3)

frostbite: a condition where the skin and underlying tissue, blood and cells actually freeze; it used to be a major cause of amputations (source: "The Enemy Within" by Richard Matheson, TOS1)

Frou-Frou: horse owned by the Vsadnikov Stables that was entered in a race at the Equine Knocks Equestrian Center on planet Gomeisa III in 2273; was jockeyed by Ensign Andrei Draganov, a navigator on the U.S.S. *Concord* who had raced horses for that stable throughout his lifetime; was named for the ill-fated horse of the same name in Leo Tolstoy's novel, *Anna Karenina* (source: "Rules of Life" by Diane Doyle, OAD)

FTL: term meaning "faster-than-light"

FTL drive: a term meaning "faster-than-light" drive; any drive system which propels a vehicle faster than the speed of light (source: "Upon Golden Tears" by Pamela Corsa, OAD)

Fudd's Eighth Law: According to Kirk in 2282, Fudd's Eighth Law was "Life only looks simple if you are". Spock disagreed and said that was merely a corollary to Fudd's Eighth Law (source: "A Hole in My Cover" by Jim Ausfahl, OAE)

fuel bins: provides the power for a lithium cracking station, such as

the one that was on Delta-Vega (source: "Where No Man Has Gone Before" by Samuel Peeples, TOS1)

fuel inlet servos: a robotic control component which controls the direction and rate of fuel being added to the intermix chamber (source: *Star Trek: The Motion Picture* by Gene Roddenberry, TMP)

fuel jettison: a switch on a shuttlecraft which dumps the fuel tanks at a rapid rate (7.5 times faster than expending it in the engines would—a 45 minute supply of fuel is jettisoned in 6 minutes) (source: "The Galileo Seven" by Oliver Crawford & S. Bar-David, TOS1)

fuel simulation studies: conducted on unbalanced warp engines to achieve a perfect balance and, thereby, warp drive (source: *Star Trek: The Motion Picture* by Gene Roddenberry, TMP)

Führer: German (a Terran language) for "leader"; title assumed by the Nazi dictator Hitler who ruled Nazi Germany, Earth, from 1933 to 1945; it was also assumed by the noted Federation historian John Gill on Ekos (source: "Patterns of Force" by John Meredyth Lucas, TOS2)

Fulastoven: a Caldonian male; a Senior Enforcer who, in 2276, helped end the topaline smuggling operations of Durit (source: *Liberation from Hell* by d. William Roberts, OAE)

full alert: a call to battle readiness; a more subtle way of ordering a red alert condition (source: *Star Trek* by Gene Roddenberry)

"full mag": colloquial expression for "full magnification" (source: *Star Trek: The Motion Picture* by Gene Roddenberry, TMP)

full magnification: an order to set the viewscreen to maximum magnification so that distant objects are more easily viewed (source: *Star Trek: The Motion Picture* by Gene Roddenberry, TMP)

Full Meritorious Honor medal: Captain Spock received one posthumously following his death in the *Enterprise* engine room; he is now the only living member of Starfleet to possess this medal of valor (source: *The Day They All Came Home* by Linda McInnis, OAF)

full-speed: equivalent to 1C or the speed of light or warp 1 (source: *Star Trek* by Gene Roddenberry)

Fundamental Declaration of the Martian Colonies: a declaration of independence written by the settlers of Mars who decided to declare themselves independent of Earth's United Nations (source: "Court Martial" by Don Mankiewicz & Steven Carabatsos, TOS1)

fundoscopic examination: an examination of the retina of the eye to check the blood vessels; you can diagnose an increase in cranial pressure with a fundoscopic examination (source: *Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home* by Leonard Nimoy et al, TVH)

fusion bomb: an Eminian and Vendikar weapon materialized by transporter over their targets; they were not used in actual combat, but rather mathematically-launched attacks; computers simulated the casualties such a device would create and ordered Eminians and Vendikar to report to their nearest disintegration chamber for termination (source: "A Taste of Armageddon" by Robert Hamner & Gene L. Coon, TOS1)

fusion reactors: see "impulse engines"

Future-of-Vulcan-as-World: each *katra* is disseminated from the Holder into the Vulcan society through the *kr'allieu* visitor custom, thereby becoming a permanent part of the telepathic oneness that all Vulcans share; it is this oneness which is the Future-of-Vulcan-as-World; during The Order After, Future-of-Vulcan-as-World becomes Vulcan-as-World, and it will continue to exist (source: *The Day They All Came Home* by Linda McInnis, OAF)

FV: abbreviation for "Federation Vessel"; a designation usually

assigned small science ships dispatched the Federation Science Council (source: "The Eye of the Beholder" by David Harmon, TAS1)
